CLUB REPORTS

Jottings from Hale Road Allotments

As I write this on a cold and wet February afternoon, it's difficult to imagine our plots to be full of young plants. However, by the time this is being read, those of us with asparagus plants will be at a point of glut, and will be looking for new ways to enjoy it. Asparagus is one of those crops that require both patience, and self control! Young plants have to remain unharvested for the first three years of their life, until they become established. In the next year a few spears can be taken, but then the following year, there will be asparagus every day for the short six week season. At that point the self control has to return. To ensure a good crop the following year the plants have to be allowed to regenerate and however tasty a spear looks it has to be left to grow!

Early potatoes will be in and will be being earthed up regularly to protect the young shoots from frost. I think one of the most exciting tasks on the allotment is digging the first root of new potatoes. It is such a joy and they always taste amazing.

We will also be eagerly awaiting the strawberry season to begin. Strawberry beds will soon be covered to keep the blackbirds off the ripening fruit. Gooseberries will be showing on the plants, and we will be hoping to avoid late frosts, as they could destroy the tiny fruits.

Many of us at Hale Road will, by this point in the season, have windowsills full of small tender plants, and will be watching the weather forecast, deciding when it will be safe to plant them out. The danger of planting out too soon can be lovely plants totally destroyed over night.

So why do we do it, when there is always something ready to destroy or nibble our crop before we get at it? Sometimes I think we all wonder! However, the satisfaction that comes from growing fruit and vegetables that can be eaten at their best is wonderful. Along with that of course there is the exercise that we all get when digging and weeding etc!

If anyone would be interested in adding their name to our waiting list for a plot please do get in touch. My details are in the club section.

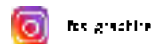

January meeting. Over 30 members attended a fascinating talk on 'The House of Spies' given by Roger Leivers. Farm Hall, at 24 West Street in Godmanchester, is a large red brick 3-storey house built in 1746, with wide gardens and orchard sweeping down to the river. In 1942 it was requisitioned by the RAF as a training centre for secret agents to be sent into occupied Europe for Special Operations Executive. It was a very busy site with about fifty permanent staff, managed by Sqn Ldr. Cautley Nasmyth Shaw, known affectionately as "Pink Gin Percy" who had fought in a Guards Regiment in WWI and joined Station X at Bletchley Park at the start of WWII. The devoted, intrepid and immensely brave men and women who trained at Farm Hall were flown across The Channel to report on enemy positions and strength, set up drop zones, safe houses and escape routes and carry out sabotage. Whereas many safely got back to England, quite a few were arrested, interrogated, tortured and executed. Immediately after the war ten leading German nuclear physicists were interned and questioned there in secrecy.

On the edge of RAF Tempsford airfield, ten miles to the south, Gibraltar Farm was designed by SOE for agents to receive pre-flight training and their equipment and kits before infiltrating Nazi-occupied Europe. In March 1942 a new squadron, 138 (Special Duties) arrived. From Tempsford they flew regular nightly sorties over Western Europe, parachuting special agents, equipment, arms and ammunition to the waiting resistance groups below. In April they were joined by 161 (Special Duties) Squadron which was tasked with covert landing and pick up operations: they landed their planes, usually Lysanders, on enemy territory to drop off agents and collect passengers, mainly downed airmen or returning agents. In total, 995 agents were parachuted into the occupied territories by the Tempsford squadrons and a further 485 landed by plane

Gibraltar Farm barn houses an exhibition about the secret activity and is open today for visitors. A memorial plaque inside nearby St Peter's church records "In thanksgiving for all who operated from RAF Tempsford airfield, 1941-1945. For the resistance workers who were flown to enemy-occupied Europe and in remembrance of those who gave their lives for freedom".

February meeting. On a cold, blustery night 32 members heard Dick Paden of Balsham talk about the Cambridge Scientific Instrument Company where he worked after leaving Trinity College with a PhD. The company was set up to service instruments for the Cambridge physiology department in the late 1870s by Robert Fulcher, Horace Darwin (son of Charles Darwin) and his Trinity College friend, Albert Dew-Smith who provided most of the finance. The small company moved to premises in Panton Street in 1881 when Fulcher left then to St Tibbs Row in 1891 when Horace Darwin became the sole owner. The rocking microtome, otherwise known as the "Darwin Rocker", which cut thin slices of materials for study by light microscopes, was one of Darwin's most successful designs of 1883/4 and it continued to be manufactured until the 1970s.

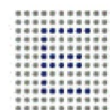
In 1895 CSI became a Limited Liability Company and moved to much larger premises in Carlyle Rd, Chesterton and William Pye, who had joined as foreman in 1880 became the Company Secretary. Pye, left in 1898 to form the W.G. Pye Instrument Company with his son, which ultimately become the Pye group of companies. In 1920 CSI took over the R.W. Paul Instrument Company of London, and became The Cambridge and Paul Instrument Company Ltd. The name was shortened to the Cambridge Instrument Company Ltd. in 1924 when it was converted to a Public limited company.

Horace died in 1928 but the company continued to progress rapidly. His nephew, Charles G. Darwin took over as chairman of the board then later became head of the National Physical Laboratory. Robert Whipple who was appointed personal assistant to Horace in 1898 eventually became Joint Managing Director then Chairman when Charles moved. Whipple's collection of scientific instruments later formed the basis of the Whipple Museum of the History of Science in 1944. When our speaker was with CSI in the 1970s the scanning electron microscope, which had been launched in Cambridge in 1965, was an important scientific instrument used worldwide.

Here at Fen Drayton Lakes, we wholeheartedly believe that one of life's simple pleasures is to go for a walk in the countryside. Nothing else can quite beat the experience of being surrounded by tranquil scenes of water, trees, and fields taking in the sights and sounds around you. With the arrival of spring, birds are singing all around, ducks and other waterbirds are out on the lakes and migrant species are arriving back from their wintering grounds to set up a territory and, hopefully, breed.

With footpaths looping around the majority of our eleven lakes, there is always something to look at. However, we are aware that it can sometimes be difficult to get good views of some of these water bodies. As a nature reserve, our primary purpose is to provide spaces for wildlife which means that many areas are left to develop and provide nesting habitat, shelter, and protection to the inhabitants.

During the spring and summer nesting season, we minimise time spent off-track and don't go into or near the habitats unless we really need to. Birds and other wildlife are easily disturbed and can be put off from using areas where people regularly go, even to the extent of abandoning nests and eggs. This means that viewpoints in the reed or hedgerows can re-grow throughout the season, closing the views.

During the autumn and winter months we work our way around the reserve, re-cutting viewpoints through to each lake. In some areas this serves a dual purpose of not only opening views for visitors, but also improving the habitat for wildlife.

The hedgerows around our entry road, various trails and on field boundaries are some of the best habitats on site for a whole variety of breeding bird species. The bulk of the hedges are hawthorn, and they tend to be of a uniform age and size. Whilst making a good hedge, this uniformity can lead to it becoming tall and 'leggy' with lots of dense

vegetation up high, but little lower down. This isn't ideal for either the health of the hedge or the nesting birds that use it. We therefore implement a regime of rotational viewpoint cutting whereby different areas of certain hedges are coppiced each year to encourage denser regrowth at a lower level. As a result of this, the hedgerows contain a patchwork of heights, densities, and growth stages to the benefit of all.

As you walk around the lakes on your next visit, keep a look out in the hedgerows for thrushes, robins, blue tits, bullfinches, blackcaps, and many other species.

Swavesey Community Orchard

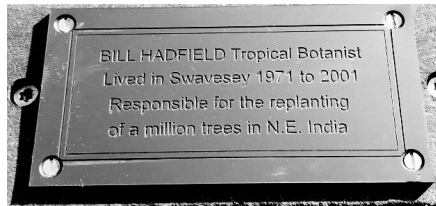
Hopefully by the time you read this article we shall have enjoyed early spring flowering bulbs and blossom on the stone fruit with some of the apples and pears still in flower?

Thanks to a grant from Natural Cambridgeshire and sponsorship from village residents we were able to replace four of the original apples and pears which had succumbed to a combination of flooding and drought. The same grant financed a new batch of daffodil bulbs plus snowdrops and fritillaria. Many thanks to those who came out to help plant the bulbs. We have also extended the apple and pear cordon to include an espalier with one pear and one apple which will be trained over the next few years.

Thanks to a very generous donation from Mo Hadfield, we have installed a picnic table in the Community area. Mo's husband Bill, who passed away in 2001, was passionate about trees and tree planting which he did on a big scale in different parts of the world. Mo thought it would be very appropriate if Bill's memory could be commemorated in Swavesey's Community Orchard.

Some of the lab work was done in Cambridge Botanic Gardens which is why we came to Swavesey.

That made their teas much cheaper than those produced in India and Ceylon, which is why everyone drinks African tea nowadays

Who knew Swavesey had a connection to that enormous change in world production of a major commodity? Mind you, the harder tea struggles to grow the finer the quality. That is why Assam tea is still a premium product, Darjeeling produces the 'Champagne of teas', bought mostly by the Russians for ridiculous prices, and why we all now drink cheaply manufactured tea in bags rather than the more classy leaf tea with the obligatory strainer.

Swavesey 100 years ago (April & May 1922)
From the Cambridge Chronicle

LARGE EGG. 7th April 1922

A white leghorn pullet belonging to Mr. George Clarke laid an egg last week which weighed ¼lb., and measured 6¾ inches in circumference.

REPRIEVED. 7th April 1922

It was announced last week that owing to shortness of funds, the services of four men who had been employed by the Rural District Council for a considerable time in cleaning out the large drains of the district would not be required after Friday. On that afternoon one of the men was informed that he could continue at work in consideration of the fact that he had a wife and seven small children dependent on him.

CHURCH WINDOW BROKEN. 21st April 1922

While attending to family graves in the south side of the churchyard on Saturday, Mr. Walter Thorp was startled by the loud report of a gun, and later, having occasion to go to the north side of the church, he found a crow that had been shot. He failed to notice whether any damage had been done and took the bird home. On Sunday it was discovered that five small panes of glass in a large four-light window at the back of the organ in the north aisle had been smashed, and the lead work bulged inwards. A few bird's feathers were found, and also traces of blood, but no bird, and for a time the breakage was a somewhat disturbing mystery. On Tuesday, however, Mr. Thorp's discovery became known, and it was then clear that the damage had been caused by the jackdaw striking the window. But who fired the shot that drove the bird into the window?

FOOTBALL CUP. 5th May 1922

Ten passengers were booked from Swavesey station to London last Saturday by the special train run in connection with the English Football Cup Final. The train left Swavesey shortly before 5 a.m.

THE WEEK'S THUNDERSTORMS. 26th May 1922

After a day of oppressive heat, a severe thunderstorm visited Swavesey on Monday afternoon, accompanied by hail of exceptionally large size. About 4 p.m. there was a very vivid flash of lightning, followed immediately by a terrific thunderclap. The Post Office in High-street and another house about 100 yards distant, over which telephone wires pass, were struck, apparently simultaneously. The noise inside the Post Office is described by the sub-postmaster as having resembled the explosion of a large gun, and both he and an old lady transacting business were much alarmed. The casing of a new lightning conductor inside the office, which was only installed last week, was forced from its fastening, and all the telephone instruments were thrown out of action, and the village was cut off telephonically and by telegraph from the outside world. A chimney at the other house, owned by Mr. W. J. Hephher, and occupied by Mr. Robert Hephher, was partly demolished, but beyond brick rubbish, soot, etc., falling down the chimney, no damage appears to have been done inside the house, though the occupants, who were at tea, were much alarmed. Some tiles on the roof were smashed. In a stable in the White Horse Inn yard on the opposite side of the street, Mr. Charles Savage and a horse were knocked down but neither man nor horse was injured. The storm was over the neighbouring village of Over about 4.39 p.m., and the hail stones are reported as having been "something very extraordinary, such as had not before been seen by the oldest inhabitants," being lumps of ice of various shapes and sizes, some measuring 2½ inches in circumference. Some damage was done to windows and glass frames.

Surrounded by Water – Almost

Part 9. More water coming to Swavesey, but don't drink it.

On 28 January 2022 SCDC Planning Committee approved plans to build a further 4,000 houses, along with associated infrastructure, just north of Oakington as part of the Northstowe Phase 3a development programme. Clearly there is a strong economic need for these houses in the Cambridge and South Cambs areas but unfortunately this benefit to Northstowe comes with increased flood risk to Swavesey residents, their property and land.

Swavesey's lowlands, Middle Fen, Mow Fen, Mare Fen and Cow Fen, cover a large area of land to the north and east of the village and they are important local environmental and agricultural assets. Starting from the north near Webb's Hole Sluice on the river Great Ouse they progressively flood in winter to an extent which is dependent on local rainfall. At the beginning of 2021 the flood water came very close to houses in Taylor's Lane, Station Road and Over Road when December and January rainfall was 114mm and 97mm respectively, far exceeding the average monthly rainfall of 46mm.

The Great Ouse, flowing from west to east, brings a large volume of water towards Swavesey and due to the enormous size of its catchment, water levels can rise and fall slowly. At an upper threshold water depth level, the doors at Webb's Hole sluice close to prevent river water flowing back inland along Swavesey Drain and flooding the village. However, with no outlet, the water coming down Swavesey Drain towards the river overtops adjacent to the sluice and floods into Middle Fen. While the doors remain closed the flooding sequentially inundates Middle, Mow then Mare Fen and finally flows across Over Road and falls into the lower land level in Cow Fen. If Cow Fen floods seriously, a large area of housing in the village is at risk.



The Utton's Drove treatment works, adjacent to the A14, already takes sewage from around 4,000 houses at Cambourne and nearly 9,000 houses

at Northstowe Phases 1 and 2. Much more sewage will be sent there from Cambourne West and Bourn Airfield (total 5,900 houses) within the next few years, with the threat of potentially far more to come later. The treated water outflow is then sent into the open drainage system across Swavesey's Fens, traveling down Utton's Drove Drain, across Cow Fen then joining Swavesey Drain and on to Webb's Hole sluice. In about 2008 Anglian Water investigated pumping the treated effluent through a pipeline from Utton's Drove direct to the river which would have removed the problem Swavesey now faces, but the additional £11 million cost ruled that out.

Swavesey's Internal Drainage Board had long been campaigning against the intention to send sewage from these further 4,000 houses to Utton's Drove works for treatment and Keith Wilderspin, Chairman of the IDB argued long and hard at the 28 January meeting. The Environment Agency claimed that if Utton's Drove works reaches full treatment capacity, which Swavesey IDB calculates could happen by 2027, the excess sewage could be sent elsewhere although the infrastructure to do that does not currently exist and would take 8 to 10 years to build. After extensive debate, lasting nearly seven hours, the committee finally came to the vote, with the majority of councillors voting in favour of the plans. Thus, the very experienced local knowledge of IDB members and other informed commentators in Swavesey was completely ignored once again and the flood risk to our village is further increased.

It gets even worse because on 28 February SCDC approved plans to build a further 1,000 houses as part of the Northstowe Phase 3b development programme. Again, the sewage will be sent to Utton's Drove works for treatment. The threat to Swavesey's Fens is even greater from this site which will be built on a block of land on the left just beyond the roundabout at the far end of Ramper Road. Swavesey Drain travels closely along the boundary of this Phase 3b site and the land slopes gently down towards it. So, both the surface water from this development and the treated sewage water will travel across Swavesey's Fens, further putting our village at risk.

The writer is aware that Swavesey Parish Council is absolutely furious about this flood risk issue, particularly from other people's sewage, which has been going on for years. On 24 February members of the PC, including Keith Wilderspin, and our District Councillor met Mr Anthony Browne MP to discuss these concerns in earnest.

Somehow there seems to be a major injustice in all this. As Will Wright, Chairman of Swavesey Parish Council, said at the end of his report in *The Meridian*, April/May 2021 on p 37, "Good luck Swavesey – time to build the ark"

Will Wright Memories

We never had a car in the family whilst I was growing up in Boxworth End, so it was either using the bike for local travel or alternatively the bus and obviously the train for real journeys. I was with my Mum & Dad when we were making a journey into Cambridge one Saturday by the bus - guess it was going to be a bit of a shopping expedition, and we were waiting at the stop out-side the strict & particular chapel in Middle Watch. My Dad noticed a load of black smoke coming from the general direction of our house at the Ramper road junction and we hurried back immediately only to see Bob Cherry's house, the old Green Man Inn next door to ours, seriously on fire with the flames occasionally licking the wall of ours, as there was very little space between the 2 buildings, thank goodness we had a tiled roof & not thatched as the old Inn was.

I can remember the fire brigade arriving and managing to extinguish the fire after a couple of hours, during which time gallons of water were splayed on our walls & roof and more importantly, as luck would have it, Dad's wooden built "kitchen" extension also survived. I don't think Mr. Cherry's house was ever fully repaired & renovated after this though he did continue to live there for a while, as I gather that several years later it had become known as the "haunted house" to future young generations in the village. No surprise that we never actually made it to Cambridge that day!

I also remember going to St. Ives by the bus, which in those days went down the Low road in Fenstanton and into St Ives town via the river bridge, as it was years before the by-pass was built. There was a windmill in the field to the left of the road just before what is now the entrance to the marina and apparently I was prone to "going into one" when I saw it, as dear old Mum used to say. The reason being that as often as not it would have meant I was on the way to the dentist, OUCH, not exactly my favourite destination in those days, though I have to say was preferable to being treated in the white mobile dentist bus that turned up in the Primary school playground every year,

Thank goodness Swavesey had a train station which in those days linked us into the National network & effectively opened up the rest of the country to us villagers, the major reason it being here was that it enabled all the local grown fruit, floral & agricultural produce to get to nationwide markets & distribution centres. Now we have a mis-guided bus - thank you Dr. Beeching.

One of Dad's brothers had a Welsh wife and a daughter, Linda, who was about my age and the six of us went on a summer holiday together in North Wales, a seaside holiday no less in the early '50's. We went to Llandudno and Colwyn Bay, which has a fantastic beach as I remember it, and even got the chance to have a bit of a look round Conway castle, and also went up the Great Orme and no we didn't climb to the top, as it actually had a small narrow gauge railway to the top or thereabouts, so we managed to hitch a lift on the train!. Needless to say we travelled by the railway to Wales and caught the train at our local Swavesey station and only changed ONCE, at Rugby I believe and that was it, Swavesey to Llandudno with just one change of train! A lot to be said for the national rail system we used to have despite almost all being steam powered back in the day.

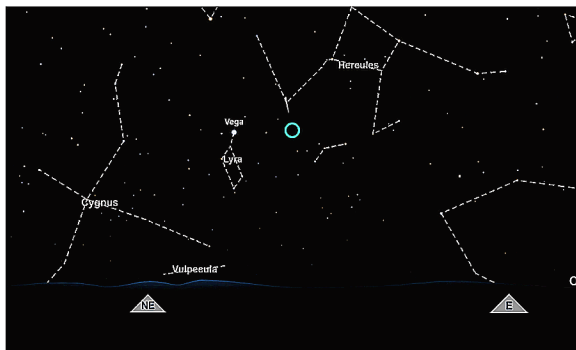
It Will Probably Be Cloudy...

A guide to the night sky over Swavesey during April and May.

After a quiet period astronomically in February and March, the Spring Equinox on March 20th means the nights are getting shorter. April and May do provide some activity including a couple of meteor showers and a lunar eclipse.

Mercury is the closest planet to orbit the Sun, which means it is quite an elusive target to spot. We only really see it when it appears at its furthest point, either east or west of the Sun.

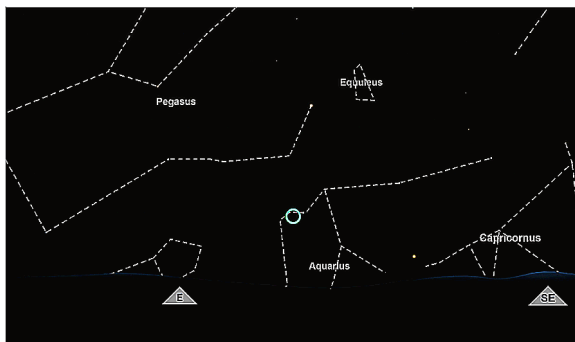
The Solar System's smallest planet puts on its best show of the year appearing above the western horizon not long after sunset on 10 April and it will be visible until the end of the month. You will have to be quick, though, as it doesn't hang around for long.



The Lyrid meteor shower will be visible from 16-25 April, peaking on the 22nd at 8pm BST and expected to produce about 17 meteors per hour. It's named after its radiant (the constellation it seems to originate from), Lyra the Harp, which will be low in the north-eastern sky around peak time. However, meteors will be visible in every direction, so pick a

location with an unobstructed view of the sky to improve your chances. The source of the Lyrid meteor shower is the Comet C/1861 G1 Thatcher, which orbits the Sun once every 415 years.

The Eta Aquariid meteor shower is active from 9 April-28 May, peaking around the 6 May and expecting to produce up to 40 meteors per hour. The pre-drawn sky offers the best chance to view lots of meteors, so look towards the East to spot the star Eta Aquariid in the constellation of Aquarius, after which the meteor shower is named. The source of the meteor shower is the famous Comet Halley, which is visible from the Earth every 75-76 years.



On 16 May 2022 a total lunar eclipse will be visible from South America, most of North America and parts of Europe and Africa. Although the whole eclipse will not be visible from the UK, we'll still be able to see the Moon at totality for a brief

period before it sets. The eclipse starts at 2.32am BST when the Moon enters the Earth's shadow (the penumbra) and totality starts at 4.29am BST when the Moon crosses into the Earth's umbra, turning it red. The Moon will set shortly after that, at 5.10am BST. To view the eclipse, find a location with an unobstructed view of the sky and look towards the Southwestern direction.

The Waxing and Waning Crescent Moon phases in April and May are the best time to see earthshine, where the unlit part of the Moon becomes visible. It is also known as Da Vinci glow after Leonardo da Vinci, who explained the phenomenon for the first time in recorded history. The 26th and 27th April then the 3rd and 4th May are the best times to see earthshine.

The full moon on 16th April was known by early Native American tribes as the Pink Moon because it marked the appearance of the moss pink, or wild ground phlox, which is one of the first spring flowers. This moon has also been known as the Sprouting Grass Moon, the Growing Moon, and the Egg Moon. Many coastal tribes called it the Fish Moon because this was the time that the shad swam upstream to spawn. This moon is also known as the Paschal Moon, which is the first Full Moon on or after March 21 and is used to determine the date of Easter.

The May full moon, coinciding with the lunar eclipse on 16th May, was known by early Native American tribes as the Flower Moon because this was the time of year when spring flowers appeared in abundance. This moon has also been known as the Hare Moon, the Corn Planting Moon and the Milk Moon.

BARWELLS

Barwells was located in Swavesey on part of the Cherry Trees Estate (Moat Way/Whitegate Close area). It had two main gates, one at the bottom of Black Horse Lane and the other where Turnbridge Court is today.

It consisted of three main departments, Engineers, Rubber Products and the Tyre Remoulders. About half the estate was a large field at the back of the site. There was a football field there and it was also used as a scrap tyre dump. It was estimated there was around a million scrap tyres there. Because of the fire risk there were fire breaks between the piles of tyres.

We also had our own fire crew led by Eddy Payne. We had two pumps and two large water tanks located at the rear of Rose Cottage in Black Horse Lane. During the summer months we would have a practice once a month. The crew was made up of local men. Luckily, we were never called up for a real fire, but in 1977 there was a fireman's strike and so we acted as back up for Swavesey. We were called out twice. The first time was a chimney fire in Middle Watch. By the time we got there someone had put it out using a wet sack. There was an air raid siren on the site and when it went off it signalled there was a fire in the village. One Sunday afternoon off it went. There was a fire in the Manor outbuildings. Unfortunately, I was down the bottom of the fen taking my dog for a walk and by the time I arrived a Green Goddess (Army fire engine) had put the fire out.

Reginald Barwell started making remould tyres in 1927 after his poultry farm was wiped out by Fowl Pest. Being a keen motorist, he looked for another venture. He bought moulding equipment from France and went on a one-week course on remoulding in London. Later his sons Eric and John joined the company. At first, he had trouble selling his tyres and opened a shop in Regent Street Cambridge. In 1931 he moved to larger premises.

At the start of WW2 rubber became scarce and remould tyres became more popular. After the war he continued to make progress. At that time Barwells were buying in preformed blanks of uncured rubber called camelbacks from Avon and Dunlop. Before rubber is cured under intense heat and pressure it is pliable and soft. Camelback is so called because the centre of it is thicker than the edges.

Barwell decided to save money by developing their own extruding machine. At first the hydraulic extruder could only go forward and had to be retracted with manual means using ropes, pulleys and sandbags. One report said the barrel they used was an ex-naval gun. Over the years they developed, then introduced a rotating blade which could be set at different speeds so other components could be made.

I joined the company in 1973, first of all working in the rubber products as a moulder. We made many different components: flails for agriculture machines; tyres for lawnmowers; rubber discs for conveyor belts – to mention a few. There was also a department rubberising rollers. Some of the metal rollers could weigh up to five tons.

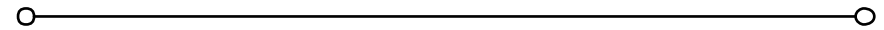
When I joined Barwells it had over 300 employees and was exporting its preformer machine worldwide. Coaches brought workers in from Cambridge and Huntingdon. Later I was transferred to the preform section making blanks for moulding. Then I had the opportunity to work in the tyre remould section.

I loved working there. The atmosphere there was fantastic. There was a real feeling of camaraderie. There was banter and jokes on each other nearly every day. Nobody got upset. It was just good fun.

I drove a tractor and trailer taking the scrap tyres down the field, also taking the new tyres to the warehouse in Taylors Lane. There was also another warehouse in Kings Lynn. In the late seventies the remould section closed and I went back to the rubber products. I took redundancy in 1980 but returned in 1986 on the preform section. One of the jobs then was supermarket trolley tyres. We had orders for 500,000 at a time.

In 1990 the rubber section was sold to Clifton Rubber in St. Ives. The moulding section moved to St Ives but the roller covering section stayed at Swavesey until 1998. In 1998 the engineering section moved to the Buckingham estate near the A14 and the Swavesey factory was demolished to make way for the Cherry Trees estate.

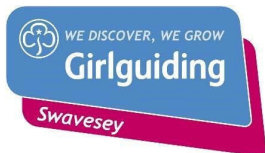

Spring Term

Rainbows: We had a mix of two fun challenge badges and two skills builder badges. Developing our influence skills, we found the difference between fact and opinions, shared our opinions and decorated wrist bands to show others what we care about. After half term we practised some camp skills, thinking about how to care for nature, made some dens, and thought about what we needed to pack. The fun badges were dinosaur and underground themed, the girls became palaeontologists and dug for their pasta fossils, they found about animals that live underground, as well as other things under the ground and finished with a Womble themed session for the section on literary characters who live underground.

We marked Shrove Tuesday with pancake tasting.

Guides: We continued with our 'Money and a message' fundraising plans. The guides learned about different ways of voting (secret ballot being the most popular) and voted to run a second hand book stall and bake sale to fundraise for their chosen charity. We also started building some leadership skills as well as taking instructions from others while doing a selection of tasks and activities. We did some unit meeting activities devised by the Royal Society of Chemistry for Girlguiding and also looked at friendship issues. Our non-programme activities included origami, cake decorating and candle making.

Rangers: This small group chose to focus on skills for their future. They looked at the risks of borrowing and using credit, how to create a meal without a cooker or hob, used their imagination and practical skills to repair and repurpose broken household items and they looked at unusual jobs and the skills needed to perform them. Their non-programme badge was 'In the dark', using all their senses to understand how nocturnal animals can live in the dark. Braille, Morse code, glow in the dark wool craft, shadow puppets and an evening walk around the village were all part of this badge

SWAVESEY PARISH

Parish Council News January-February 2022

BLOOR HOMES, FEN DRAYTON ROAD

Mr Alex Clark, the Design and Technical Director, attended the February meeting to share the issues affecting the site following its completion:

The telemetry system controlling the flow of surface water from the site to the river is now to be installed after many delays.

He reported that Bloor were to improve drainage to the green open space and play area which will remain part of the management arrangements set up to manage public spaces. Councillors stressed that residents were concerned and that fully usable open space in all weathers was essential.

Councillors noted that improved public footpaths to the RSPB reserve and adjacent to the site should be investigated.

The access to the farmland alongside the housing site, from Fen Drayton Road is to be the subject of a planning application. The PC requested that the access be gate and fenced from the play area and road.

COUNTY COUNCIL

The PC continues to follow up issues affecting road repairs throughout the village and in particular repairs to Gibraltar Lane, Fen Drayton Road and Over Road.

The PC is investigating the responsibility for the maintenance of the trees etc. and the verge in Gibraltar Lane. It is apparent that this land was retained by the developers of the Carters Way/Priory Avenue area who now no longer exist. The PC will confirm this situation with Land Registry and hope to carry out a one off clear-up before including it in our regular grounds maintenance contract.

The PC re-considered an application for a disabled persons parking bay in Thistle Green and having taken into account both the applicant's and adjoining residents' letters, the PC still considered the eligibility criteria listed on the CCC website had not been met and confirmed its objection.

The PC has been in discussion with Anglian water concerning flooding from the foul drainage system into gardens of houses around Ramper Road. Although the drains have received maintenance the PC continues to press for action to ensure it doesn't happen again.

The PC is working with the Swavesey Internal Drainage Board to coordinate comments on the Environment Agency Flood Risk Management Plan and their River Basin Management Plan which are out for consultation.

DISTRICT COUNCIL

District and Parish Council Elections will be held on 5th May 2022. The Notice of Election will be published on 28th March and nomination forms may be obtained and returned to South Cambs District Council Electoral Office between 29th March and 5th April. All eleven seats on the Parish Council will be up for election for the next four-year term of office. The PC agreed to nominate Mrs J Kerr, for her work with the Swavesey Together Group, to be considered to represent us at The Cambridgeshire County Day on the 23rd June 2022

PLANNING

A number of planning applications have been considered which are detailed in Meeting Minutes available on the Council website.

COUNCIL NEWS

Planning Application from Mick George for the Waste Site off Middle Fen Drove

The PC raised a number of conditions it wished to be applied to the approval if granted and were represented at the meeting. These were circulated to all the committee members and to our County Councillor Mandy Smith. The application was approved with conditions. Mick George agreed to reduce traffic movements to 60 a day, from the 80 originally requested. Concrete crushing is limited to one instance of 4 weeks, subject to further applications. Additional operational conditions were also included which will be detailed in the decision notice when published.

The planning applications for Northstowe 3A and 3B have received outline planning permission. The Parish Council and Swavesey IDB objected on a number of issues and attended the planning meetings.

The Clerk has written to our MP to raise our ongoing concerns relating to drainage from Northstowe and other large developments and its impact on Swavesey. District Cllr, IDB Chairman and the Clerk met with our MP to reiterate the concerns with regard to flood risk in this area.

The PC is pressing for action to alleviate traffic problems at the Ramper Road/Boxworth End area, resulting from the impact of Northstowe. The PC understands there will be funding from developers for villages surrounding Northstowe for traffic calming and management measures. The PC does not know the detail of these yet.

The Bushmead Homes site, off Middle Watch is due to commence ground works and site entrance road in early April.

VILLAGE MATTERS

Cycle stands and safety bollards are to be installed close to the village sign in Market Street.

The PC received an update on progress with the Neighbourhood Plan and approved an application for grant funding from 'Locality' to assist in employing professional help in developing the plan.

The PC considered ways to replant areas around the Moat Way Open Space area.

New benches and litter bins have been installed.

Primary School access from the Recreation Green. The Headteacher, Ms Anna Norden attended the February meeting to request that the entrance to the school from the green be maintained after the COVID need for separate access and a one-way system was no longer required. She explained that the increasing school roll and the pressure on the front entrance was increasing safety concerns. The Clerk to the PC explained the legal restraints governing the use of registered village greens. Councillors were concerned at the effect of many users and the resulting muddy access impacting on recreation users and school visitors. It was agreed to investigate ways to resolve the problems in conjunction with the pavilion and football clubs. Funding will be required.

FINANCE

The PC approved the budget for the coming year at its January meeting, and resolved to approve a precept for the 2022/2023 financial year of £85,480.00 resulting in an increase of £1.00/year to the Band D Rate, equating to an annual charge of £81.89 per year.

Grant Applications: The PC approved two grant applications:

1. £35,000.00 towards the Scout Hut refurbishment from section 106 monies set aside from housing developments
2. £90.00 to the Swavesey Sustainability Hub to cover the cost of the hire of the Memorial Hall for the first 'Sustainability Weekend' of events to be held on 25-26 June 2022.

3G Sports Facility: The PC received the loan applied for last year and passed this on as grant funding towards the new 3G artificial grass sports facility on the College playing fields. Work will commence in May and the facility will be available for use from September. This will be open for use by the community and local sports clubs as well as by the College..
