Of course, our club isn't just about competing against the others, it is about sharing one's love of photography, and members are always happy to help the less experienced among us. We have two Members' nights, the first on 2nd Feb. the other on March 23rd when once again the more experienced photographers will show us their work, anything from a video show to generously shared advice on technical matters. The details will be announced closer to the night. We also have a workshop on 9th March, when we split up into groups for different topics lead by those more technically able.

Only two outside lectures this time, one on Zoom from Wales, on Feb.23rd given by Gareth Martin, a member of Afan Nedd Camera Club. It is titled 'In The Making', not sure what that will bring us but his website has some brilliant photographs. The other is another technical talk, 'The Photoshop Workflow'. This is on 16th March, back in the College.

By this time we should all be top notch experts in every aspect of photography, very convenient, as our Annual Exhibition will be held in Swavesey Memorial Hall on March 25th, when you can see the results for yourselves, (and have a coffee and cake too). This is slightly earlier than in other years, so do keep an eye on notices about the Open Competitions and how to submit your entries. Details can be found on our website, which will also give details of coming along to any of our meetings as a visitor for a small fee.

Swavesey & District History Society

November meeting. Charles Dickens remarked, "Bury St Edmunds is a handsome little town" and Adrian Tindall, speaking to 35 members, used many images of the abbey and important town buildings to illustrate this. The earliest settlement in Bury St Edmunds dates back to around 400 AD but not until about 630 AD does the first documentary evidence mention a settlement of King Sigebert on the river Lark. There were frequent invasions by the Vikings, and when Anglo-Saxon King Edmund led his troops against them in 869 AD his forces were defeated and he was martyred for refusing to renounce his Christian faith. His remains were placed in a shrine and in 1020 King Canute established a Benedictine abbey to house the shrine. The abbey was one of the largest churches in Europe, its footprint covering 10 ha (25 acres). His shrine attracted many thousands of pilgrims from all over Europe, bringing vast wealth to the abbey and also helping the town to flourish. But conflict between the abbey and town led to riots, rebellions and even massacres. On a tall pillar alongside the end of the abbey church a plaque commemorates the spot where, in 1214, the barons of England met to agree the terms of a contract to be put to King John, now known as the Magna Carta.

The dissolution of the monasteries destroyed the abbey in 1539 but left many ruins of a great church. After the destruction much of Bury's wealth came from the wool trade although the town is rich in architecture from every era since Norman times. Our attention was drawn to, among others, the Grade 1 Theatre Royal, a restored 1819 Regency theatre, the Grade 1 Corn Exchange which opened for business in 1862 and quickly became one of the busiest in the country, the famous Nutshell pub which has a maximum permitted capacity of 15 customers, Moyse's Hall, built in around 1180, the Greene King Brewery Visitor Centre and The Athenaeum, originally built in the 18th century as Assembly Rooms and where Charles Dickens gave several readings from his works. Dickens stayed in the nearby Angel Hotel in 1859 and 1861 and his first novel, *The Pickwick Papers*, immortalises the town and specifically mentions the Angel Hotel.

December meeting. On a dreadfully cold, frosty evening with icy roads everywhere, about 20 hardy souls turned out for the AGM. After the formal proceedings there were five very varied, short presentations, each of which was excellent:-

Roger Hetherington (Over) reported on a new heritage centre to be set up at Northstowe. The small site is funded by Cambs County Council and will be ready for use by Easter 2023. As well as being a repository of finds from the A14 upgrade it will house local heritage collections, including items/documents from Over and Swavesey, to form a regional centre for the south-western Fen Edge heritage.

Carole Pook, (Swavesey) showed 3 of her father's possessions from the 1950s connected with his senior management post with W J Bush (later Bush Boake Allen) who produced fragrance, aroma and flavour chemicals. The first, a container, was delivered to him in the late '50s by two burly men from the Bulgarian embassy, containing rose oil worth about £3,000 at the time. The second was a glass bottle

around 15 cm tall which he made, containing an early aerosol dispenser. The filler was a fluorocarbon so this device was possibly initially responsible for the hole in the ozone layer. Even smaller was a pipette of grains from the wrappings around Tutankhamun's body and he was asked to identify the perfumes in the grains

Richard Hart (Swavesey) had recently discovered over 40 glass slides from around 1905, wrapped in brown paper in his mother's belongings. She had not unwrapped them since inheriting them from Richard's grandma, Dorian, in the 1950s. Now able to be viewed on modern equipment, they are high quality photos of his ancestors showing the family, notably Dorian, at the seaside, at home, at a farm and in the country. Many pretty hats were worn by the ladies and young girls.

Julie Carter (Over) spoke of her father, Frank Cruickshank, a Scottish professional footballer who played at full back. Born in Polmont, near Falkirk, in 1931 he first played for Burnley then Nuneaton, Notts County for a long period, Cheltenham Town then, from 1961, as player-manager for Cambridge City. 1963 was a particularly successful year.

Linda and Colin Saunders (Swavesey) read out entries from Samuel Pepys' diary. Born in 1633, he kept his detailed diary from 1660 to 1669, stopping because he wrongly thought he was going blind. During this time there were many notable events in England including the plague of 1665, the Great Fire of London and Charles II's coronation. He studied at Magdalen College in Cambridge.

Warren Wright Memories

Needless to say moving to the centre of the village opened up new groups of friends with whom I could meet more frequently, one result of which was there where about half a dozen of us who enjoyed fishing & camping. So it wasn't long before we would take the tents and set up a mini camp by the Ouse just down stream from the Covell's drain gates for about 4 or 5 days, fishing late night & early hours and swimming during the daytime. We used to light a smallish camp fire which would last for hours on end when layers of dried cow dung were placed on the top - this was sometimes used as a barbie.

The river bank just up stream from Covell's drain was far better for swimming as we could also dive in on account of the increased depth of water. In those times the rivers were in the hands of the National Rivers Authority and there was a dredger which regularly operated between St.Ives & Over staunch which used to keep the waters flowing and the banks maintained. Sadly the Environment Agency have been in control for many years now & would not even consider any such action - heaven forbid, they might even trap a one eared mollusc in the process, as if any living creature will hang around with the noise & vibration emitted by a working dredger!, and I promised not to mention the Somerset levels. On one occasion we found a rather dilapidated punt in the reeds upstream, which we pulled out and used several times, each time having to hide it back in the reeds with a few tubs of water therein when we had finished for the day.

So there we were at the start of the 60's, what an age to have grown up in with so many things going on for the younger generation who I understand are now labelled as the "Baby boomers". Going to school in Cambridge opened up contacts with fellow students from all round the County and in fact the Country to a degree, as the City attracted people from all round the world with many of them having younger family needing education.

"Butlins by the Sea", Billy Butlin had opened a range of holiday camps around the UK which provided all inclusive holidays with cabin accommodation and various forms of entertainment based on a "walk in" entrance with your camp card. Some of these camps were old prisoner of war camps which were re-vitalised in the late 40's & 50's. One of these sites was situated on the coast just north of Skegness and we went there on family holidays on at least 3 occasions, travelling by coach. The camp had it's own fun fair with all rides free of additional charges - never a dull moment for us youngsters. I remember going into the large entertainment site theatre on a couple of occasions to see the bands, one of whom was in fact Liverpool based Rory Storm & the Hurricanes who had, at the time, a drummer named Richard Starkey who, a couple of months later had become BINGO no, Ringo Starr, who had then joined an upcoming band known as "The Beatles". All

the camps were well known for the staff members who were known as the "Redcoats" who were always on hand to solve any problems or queries that clients may have had, many of these people moved on to earn a living in the entertainment world.

At the time we started travelling by train to & from school the railways were undergoing the change of engines from steam power to diesel engines and we could never be sure what form of engine was powering the morning train though there was almost always one of the new diesel units for the return journey which left Cambridge at 4 o'clock or thereabouts.

Very cold winter weather caused problems with the morning trains, especially the winter of '62/'63 when the temperature did not get above freezing for some 5 weeks or more. It was cold enough to even freeze some parts of the UK's shallow coastal waters and cars could be seen driving along the river Cam in Cambridge & on the Great Ouse between St. Ives & Overcoat and probably many other waterways in the country. Our morning journey to school was affected on many occasions when we were scheduled a diesel engine, but the fuel had frozen, so a steam train had to be used and of course you can't just push a button to start the steam engines. Subsequently there were a few incidents when the morning school train did not arrive at Swavesey station until well after 9 o'clock by which time we should have been in class. Needless to say we County boys decided it would of course be far too dangerous for us to take the short cuts through the goods marshalling yards to Hills Road bridge, so we all walked to the top of Station Rd. before then turning left towards Hills Rd bridge and eventually getting into the classroom between 10:00 & 11:00am - "So sorry Sir but the train was late, and we don't have bus passes ! "

This extreme weather period also brought a national event to the village when the British outdoor speed skating championships were held on Mere Fen, which had been flooded due to the river overflow and excessive rain prior to the major new year freeze. I think our fen may have been used for this type of event before as apparently it was, and probably still is, one of the few outdoor locations where a lap of 1 mile could be accessed with just one turn!. Many people were using the traditional fen runner skates but obviously all of the serious contenders were using Norwegian skate blades which were considerably longer. I was lucky enough to be able to use my Dad's Norwegian blades, not that I did any racing but it was fun just to skate round the fen area. The water must have been frozen right down to the ground as the number of people walking and of course skating on it was substantial to say the least and I couldn't remember any breaks in the ice. One thing that really sticks in my mind was that on the special competition days Ray Oakman, who ran the village fish & chip shop - now by the rear gated entrance to the White Horse, was selling his produce to clients on the ice on Mere fen. It may seem relatively easy with today's available technology but we are talking 60 years ago! However Ray had used his initiative and transported a small box freezer on to the site and brought the heated bags of the produce up to be temporarily stored therein. I'm not sure how the inside of the freezer was initially heated but with the heavy internal insulation therein the bagged fish & chips maintained a satisfactory edible temperature..

Swavesey 100 Years ago (Feb & March 1923) From the Cambridge Chronicle

BOYS' F.C. 2nd Feb. 1923

The Swavesey Sunday School Boys' Football Club has been disbanded, and, after payment of expenses, etc., the balance in hand from subscriptions has been distributed amongst the members, each of whom has received 1s. 2d.

THE PUBLIC DRAINS. 9th Feb. 1923

Dr. H. T. Calvert, an Inspector of the Ministry of Health, who was accompanied by Dr. F. Robinson (County Medical Office) and Dr. R. Grove (District Medical Officer of Health) on Friday, made an exhaustive inspection of the sanitary arrangements of the new Council houses and of the open public drains from Middle Watch to the Church Bridge. Messrs. F. Kirby, R. Norman and C. Wood (District Councillors), F. G. Reynolds (Sanitary Inspector), and F. Hagger (District Surveyor) were also present.

DARK STREETS 2nd March 1923

Several mishaps, none, fortunately, attended with serious consequences, have recently occurred in the dark streets and lanes of the village. The following instances may be cited: A lad walking home collided with the rain-water pipe of a shed in Wallman's-lane, and was knocked down dazed into the mud, injuring his knee, cutting his nose, and grazing his face. Papers he was carrying were damaged with mud and water. On the same evening a fish merchant, riding a cycle, had a spill, apparently through colliding with something in the gloom. On Friday night an old inhabitant completely lost his bearings on a road with which he was well acquainted and had to wait until another parishioner came along who could put him in the way he should go. A lady, after visiting a sick relation, struck her head against a brick gate post when trying to effect an entrance to her own premises. She sustained a black eye. Passengers alighting at the railway station from the brightly illuminated L. and N.E.R. carriages experience difficulty in finding their way along the tree-lined road into the village, and it is suggested that a lamp near Swan Pond, or at the main churchyard gate, would act as a beacon towards which pedestrians could make their way.

BREAD. 9th March 1923

The retail price of bread in Swavesey was reduced to 4d. per 2lb. loaf on Monday.

THE CUCKOO. 16th March 1923

A local railway official reports that he heard the cuckoo in Mow Fen at 6.30 a.m. on Sunday, and he indignantly repudiates the suggestion that the bird he heard was an adjunct of a clock in a house in the neighbourhood.

HOCKEY. 16th March 1923

The Swavesey mixed hockey team entertained Cambridge Town mixed eleven on Saturday. The game was very fast, both teams playing up well. At the interval the score stood 2 – 1 in favour of Swavesey, but during the second half the Town scored twice and the game ended in a win for the visitors by four goals to three. H. Topham (2) and J. H. Johnson scored for Swavesey.

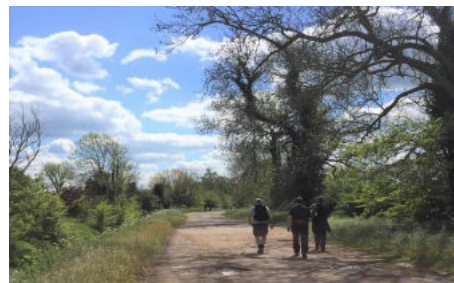
Over Day Centre - Some Events for 2023

We hope the 5-pubs, 12 mile walk, will have a choice of stops at the usual watering-holes of Pike & Eel, Needingworth; The Ferryboat, Holywell; The Three Tuns, Fen Drayton; The White Swan, Swavesey; and the Community Centre, Over.

The Bike Rides will again have a choice of fully route-marked rides, planned by Willingham Wheels and Swavesey & Over Cycling Club. You will be able to choose from 100km, 50km and family routes through local countryside and villages. Afterwards you will be welcome to join us for an after-ride social at the Community Centre, Over.

Willingham Wheels are also organising a 'Sofa-to-50k', 8-week training programme, for novice riders to gradually increase their distance, culminating in the 50k ride. For details, please contact Nigel at sofa250k@outlook.com.

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

This issue's article is about the strange world of fungi. Many people think fungi only appear in the autumn but in fact various species can be poking out of the ground or wood all year round. The keen mycologist (the term for someone who studies fungi) always knows to keep their eyes on the ground where they might chance upon an exciting find.

Fungi have perplexed scientists for generations. They were once thought to be related to plants but in fact are more evolutionarily related to animals. Nowadays they are granted their own kingdom in the web of life. The variety of species is simply enormous, and it can take many years to fully document the breadth of species which can occur on a site such as Fen Drayton Lakes. Hundreds, if not thousands, of fungi species occur here and we have only scratched the surface of what can be found so far.

Bracket fungi are one of the easiest groups to spot. Favouring obvious locations on trunks of trees or stumps. They are frequent in the countryside and include species with enticing names like the juicy red Beefsteak, and Chicken-of-the-Woods, a bright yellow-orange bracket which grows in tiers.

One which many visitors might see at the reserve is the Candlesnuff, also known as the Stag's Horn. It has tiny stick-like structures which branch at the top and turn from black to white. It grows out of logs and stumps which are rotting down.

A recent find on the reserve was of several Parasol Mushrooms, which were the size of dinner plates. It is easy to see how this species gets its name with the slender stem and umbrella shaped cap. They are always a crowd-pleaser.

Fungi do several incredibly important jobs in nature. The first is that some help trees access nutrients which significantly improves tree health and growth. They also help to rot down leaves, twigs, logs and stumps which contributes towards producing soils. Finally, a small number cause tree decay which is an important process in

woodland and creates dead wood which many insect species require.

Back to the birds, and now it is winter, a cold snap could see the arrival of large numbers of ducks and waders to the area. In previous winters the reserve has hosted a small number of Smew. A scarce duck from the continent with the drakes dressed in a pure white feathering with black stripes and a black face patch. Search for this duck on Ferry and Drayton Lakes in particular.

It Will Probably Be Cloudy...

A guide to the night sky over Swavesey during February and March.

The full moon on 5th February was known by early Native American tribes as the Snow Moon because the heaviest snows usually fell during this time of the year. Since hunting is difficult, this moon has also been known by some tribes as the Hunger Moon, since the harsh weather made hunting difficult.

As soon as the sun drops below the southwestern horizon on 22nd February, look for a waxing crescent moon snuggling up to the king of the planets, Jupiter. Brilliant Venus will be positioned a little beneath in the sky, vying for attention. The two celestial bodies will put on an amazing show as they appear to brush past each other only one degree apart.

If you follow the two brightest planets, Venus and Jupiter during early 2023, you will notice that they slowly converge in the southwestern sky. On the evening of 1st March, these superbright worlds will make their closest approach to each other, passing within half a degree—close enough to see the disks of both clearly in the same field of view.

The full moon on 7th March was known by early Native American tribes as the Worm Moon because this was the time of year when the ground would begin to soften and the earthworms would reappear. This moon has also been known as the Crow Moon, the Crust Moon, the Sap Moon, and the Lenten Moon.

The March equinox occurs on 20th March. The Sun will shine directly on the equator and there will be nearly equal amounts of day and night. This is also the first day of spring (vernal equinox).

Very prominent all year round in the northern night sky is the constellation Cassiopeia. Nicknamed the W constellation, Cassiopeia is easily recognizable for the prominent W asterism formed by its five brightest stars. The constellation was first catalogued by the Greek astronomer Ptolemy in the 2nd century.



Cassiopeia contains several notable deep sky objects, among them the open clusters Messier 52 and Messier 103, the Heart Nebula and the Soul Nebula, the supernova remnant Cassiopeia A, the star-forming cloud popularly known as the Pacman Nebula, the White Rose Cluster, and the magnitude 8.8 star Lewis Craig Mannion which can be found at RA 1hr, Dec 64 degrees.

In mythology, Cassiopeia was the wife of King Cepheus of Ethiopia. Once, she boasted that she was more beautiful than the Nereids. The Nereids were the 50 sea nymphs fathered by the Titan Nereus. They were enraged by Cassiopeia's comments and appealed to Poseidon to punish Cassiopeia for her boastfulness. Poseidon was married to one of the nymphs, Amphitrite.

The sea god obliged and sent Cetus, a sea monster represented by the constellation Cetus (the Whale), located in the same region of the sky, to ravage the coast of Cepheus' kingdom. Cepheus turned to an oracle for help and the oracle told him that, in order to appease Poseidon, he and Cassiopeia had to sacrifice their daughter Andromeda to the sea monster. Reluctantly, they did so, leaving Andromeda chained to a rock for the monster to find. However, she was saved at the last minute by the Greek hero Perseus, who happened to be passing by, saw Andromeda and rescued her from the monster.

Perseus and Andromeda were later married. At the wedding, one of her former suitors Phineus appeared, and claimed that he was the only one who had the right to marry Andromeda.

There was a fight and Perseus, desperately outnumbered, used the head of Medusa to defeat his opponents. One look at Medusa's head turned them all into stone. In the process, however, the king and queen also met their end because they did not look away from the monster's head in time.

It was Poseidon who placed Cassiopeia and Cepheus in the sky. Cassiopeia, the myth goes, was condemned to circle the celestial pole forever, and spends half the year upside down in the sky as punishment for her vanity. She is usually depicted on her throne, still combing her hair.

A Glance at the Past in February and March From the Cambridge Chronicle

1854, 25 Mar. Vestry Meeting. An unusual vestry meeting was held last Thursday to consider repairs to the Parish Church and the propriety of obtaining a loan of the necessary amount from The Exchequer Loan Commissioners. The affair caused great excitement and the proposition was firmly opposed by the Dissenters.

1855, 3 Feb. Inquest. This was held on William Cain. The deceased lived alone and a neighbour, on hearing him moaning went in and found him very ill. She gave him some hot gin and water and sent for the doctor who diagnosed heart disease. Cain died 5 minutes later. Verdict Natural Causes.

1856, 23 Feb. Drainage Meeting. Held at The White Horse by owners and occupiers of land. Resolved that a committee ascertain the number of acres which need draining, the several lengths of leading drains, & cost of a steam engine. To report on 12 March.

1865, 25 Mar. Fire. On Sunday 19th inst. Between 4 and 5, a fire broke out at the house occupied by a family called Dodson. It rapidly spread to the adjoining house occupied by the family, Ely. Both houses were destroyed but use of the parish engine prevented further destruction.

1868, 1 Feb. Missionary Service. Held in St Andrew's Church. The sermon given by the Lord Bishop of Honolulu. Collection for the Propagation of Gospel in Foreign Parts.

1888, 3 Feb. Primrose League. Thornhill Habitation (Swavesey). Monthly meeting, when Dr Ellis gave a talk on the proposed alterations to the County boundaries in the Local Government Bill and urged that a petition should be signed against the changes as this would greatly interfere with ecclesiastical, petty sessional, highway and political arrangements. Petition signed by the parishioners of Swavesey, Over, Conington, Boxworth and Lolworth ratepayers, that these parishes should not be severed from the County of Cambridgeshire.

1893, 3 Feb. Concert. Held in the National School on 24th Jan. in aid of the church organ fund. A large audience enjoyed the first half which was devoted to vocal and instrumental recitals and the second half in which a play entitled "The three wishes" was performed.

1893, 17 Feb. Hay Factor's Failure. The summary of the statement of Charles Crisp showed a deficiency of £42-7s-11d. The debtor blamed the inferior quality of the hay which he'd bought.

1896, 14 Feb. Fire. Large straw stack and two haystacks burnt down in a field on Drayton Road, property of Mr Ezra Day. Supposed incendiary. The hay was insured.

1896, 14 Feb. Fatal Accident. the son of Mr. Hawkes, brewer, was buried in the Churchyard. The boy was knocked down and killed by a train whilst walking along the line to St. Ives Grammar School. There was much sympathy for the parents and family. P. C. Kitchen rendered good service by keeping good order among the attendance of 300 mourners.

1898, 4 Feb. Continuing Debate. The adjourned debate "Poverty, its causes, moral and physical effects" was again the subject. Mr Jesse Hepher again opened the discussion and was followed by H Beaumont, A Wilson, W Hepher. E Williams, J Taylor, Mr H.S.Aldred (Secretary) present.

1898, 11 Feb. Mutual Improvement Society. Social evening on Tuesday. Mr Aldred presided. Songs & recitations. H Beaumont, J Hepher, A Wilson, P Beaumont, W Hepher, C Taylor, F Clark, L Hepher, H Clark and the Chairman.

1898, 18 Feb. Musical Evening. Held by Mutual Improvement Soc on Tuesday. The piano accompaniment by Mr Beaumont.

1898, 25 Feb. Vicar's Tea. Given on Wed 16th inst. to the Mother's Meeting. On the next day to the Women's Guild & Girl's Friendly Society. Sunday and Day School teachers were entertained at school by the Vicar and his wife.

1898, 11 Mar. Seaman's Life. Mr. James Dean gave a talk on Tuesday evening at the Mutual Improvement Society. Mr. Dean's personal experience of life on the ocean waves, which included catching sharks, mutiny aboard ship, and adventure on a desert island.

1899, 10 Feb. Concert. Held in schoolroom, in aid of Church Tower Repair Fund on Thursday on the 2nd inst. Performers Messrs Broxholme & Cohen of Trinity College, Mr White of Caius, and Williams, Rutter & Moyle Cooper of Queens College.

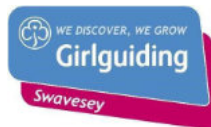

Parish Council News November/December 2022

County Council Highways

The Fen Drayton Road speed reduction & new buffer zone works encompassing the Folly Rd. estate entrance & the rear entrance to the village college should be completed by the time you read this edition of the magazine, as we were notified in December that the project would be completed between the 1st & the 21st of January. No doubt the diversions which were in place as a result of the necessary road closure would have caused the usual problems but we sincerely believe the improved safety element was very much required. The question remains as to WHY, when the existing village boundaries of rural villages are extended by such new developments, do the Highways team not INSIST that the cost of all necessary road safety improvements be paid by the developers and not the local residents?

The PC had to make a decision on next year's Local Highways Initiative bid in December on account of all applications being required to be in by January 6th. It was agreed that a funding bid be submitted for a major improvement to the School Lane/Thistle Green junction, there being many reasons for this including traffic calming, safer road crossing points, improving the safety aspect of journeys to & from the primary school and some additional yellow lining to (hopefully) make people think twice before parking on the junction.

The PC has also been notified of forthcoming section 106 monies for road improvements from Phase 1 of the Northstowe development for villages around Northstowe - watch this space.

The collection of speed and traffic counter data is on-going, together with discussions with the County highways to compile evidence to back up forthcoming traffic calming applications along with LHI funding bids.

District Council

The Judicial Review concerning the manner in which phases 3a & 3b of the Northstowe development were passed has been withdrawn by Fews Lane Consortium Ltd. The Joint Partnership have been awarded £10,000 in damages, the PC did support Fews Lane Consortium in this but did not get involved financially.

There has been an update on the licensing of street trading & food vans.

Planning

The PC commented on the planning details for access to the agricultural land between the Folly Rd. estate & the village college, this mainly concerned the original agricultural access gate alongside the rear entrance to the village college. It was agreed to request that a gate should be installed at the Fen Drayton Rd. end of the track and that for safety reasons it should be set into the site at sufficient distance to allow for machinery and any trailer to pull in off the road before stopping to open or close the gate for both safety & security

reasons. The implementation of the post and rail fencing along the boundary of the track with the Public Open Space area is welcomed, however there is a need for wire netting to be installed along it for safety reasons and to stop direct access out onto Fen Drayton Rd.

Drainage

The PC has received no further information regarding the EA telemetry system being located at Webb's Hole sluice gates & pump.

Drains alongside the Recreation Green, School Lane and Station Rd. have been cut and cleared. The drain between the primary school pond and the entrance has also been cleared and Swan Pond has also had further machine clearing work carried out.

Other Business.

A virtual briefing meeting with a consultation on sustainable travel zone and new bus routes didn't provide much hope for a better bus route for our village, in fact if anything it would probably be worse & less sustainable for most of the residents other than those residing close to the Guided Busway. The above could maybe be enhanced by the new routing of the villages 5A service which now runs a circular route from the Longstanton Park & ride, down Ramper Rd. before turning right into the village, then going up through Over & into Willingham before turning right and back to the Park & ride. There are no buses doing the route in the opposite direction so 2 buses to reach Bar Hill!. Such a pity that all our shelters are on the opposite side of the road & are therefore now redundant. Furthermore once the new timetables were put into use it turns out that the proposed journey time of 30 minutes for a bus to complete this circular journey route is not possible!, The proposed time of 30 minutes should in fact be 45 minutes which has caused little short of absolute chaos for all users let alone the poor customers that have to use the additional bus to access Bar Hill !! I'm afraid it really proves what little knowledge Stagecoach have of the reality of traffic volumes and journey times in rural areas undergoing rather large developments - or maybe they just intended it to be used as an excuse for NOT supplying the service in the future.

The PC discussed the introduction of the possibility of a Swavesey Community Award scheme which received positive support so watch this space!

The clerk and 5 councillors met with Laragh Homes & the Hundred Houses Society to discuss a Housing Needs Survey. It was an impromptu discussion but we did agree that a Housing Needs Survey would be beneficial to the Parish and could be incorporated into the Neighbourhood Plan. The Parish Council will work with Cambs ACRE to distribute the survey in the next month or and we would encourage all residents to please complete and return it.

The PC agreed the appointment of both the External & Internal Auditors for 2022/23.

From Your DC - Sue Ellington

Hello Everybody

It only seems like yesterday I wrote the contribution for Christmas and the New Year Meridian when I was concerned about the Congestion Charging proposals. This concerns have not gone away but I am sure we will hear more in 2023. The cold snap has caused lots of concerns for energy costs and how everybody is coping with the increasing cost of living. I am encouraged to see how well the community is rising to the occasion with the Bethel church, St Andrew Church and Thistle Green Communities all taking positive action to help those who need it. Also The Parish Council has access to Galons Trust funds which can be used to help in an emergency.

I am delighted that South Cambs are using their housing organisations to develop a building to create seven single person flats for single men who are facing homelessness. Single men often do not have the same level of housing urgency as individuals with children. Also most available housing is for more than one person so this group can be sofa surfing or in bed and breakfast for long periods.

The District Council Refuse and Recycling service had a problem with bin collection during the cold period due to the road conditions in some of our smaller roads and the fact that the bin lids were frozen shut. They apologise for any inconvenience and will collect them on the next usual collection plus any side waste necessary.

The 4 day week six month experiment commences in January. This project will allow desk staff to do their usual work in 4 days instead of 5. The offices will still be open 5 days a week and teams will ensure their responsibilities are covered on all days. It is hoped that this will encourage staff recruitment but will be evaluated and reviewed in July.

There is a call for more families who are willing to provide a home for Ukrainian refugees as the original arrangements were for six months and many of these refugees need to move. If you can help, please contact the council.

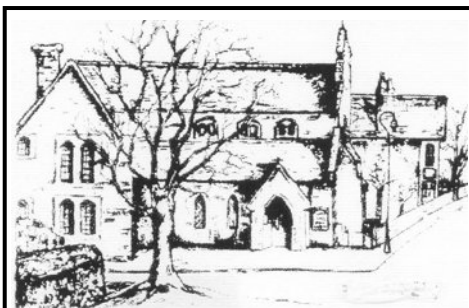

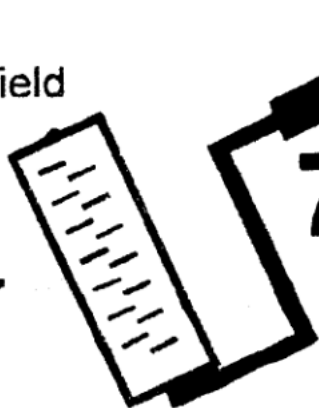
