Swavesey Spartans FC



World Cup. Following on from the questions left hanging on the Women's World Cup in the last edition of the Meridian, we know the answers.....USA did not complete a run of 3 successive wins, England did not record their first ever triumph but they did reach the final where Spain emerged from the other 30 nations at the finals to become World Champions for the first time ever. A single goal giving Spain victory in Sydney. So near, but just a step too far for the Dutch born England Head Coach Sarina Wiegman and her Lionesses.

The Club. The new season sees a new chairperson, Lewis Walsh, a new Secretary, Neil Jordison and a new treasurer, Amanda Foreman at the Spartans helm. Contact details are in the club information section of this Meridian.

How we operate. We have boys' and girls' teams entered in local leagues and we have players who only want to train. Fees start at £95 for the season and the most expensive fees are currently £140. The fees cover training costs, club insurance and mandatory activities that the club needs to comply with including ensuring we remain FA Chartered compliant. During the period from 1 September to 31 May all players will be able to train for one hour midweek on the new floodlit Artificial Grass Pitch at Swavesey Village College. We have our annual club celebration on Father's Day in June. Each player receives a memento and league teams have a players and manager annual awards. Each team plays around 20 league games.

This season Spartans will try to form an Under 7 (school year 2) squad (boys and girls) with a view to taking their first steps in the Mini League in the 2024/25 season. The club runs teams in most age groups of the local youth football spectrum, including the girls only competitions. Our oldest players are sixth form students, the majority of whom attended Swavesey Village College. Games are played on Swavesey Green, at Swavesey Village College as well as on pitches in Fen Drayton and Elsworth. Spartans are an FA Chartered Standard Club with all the coaches being trained to the FA dictated standard as well as having the necessary governance checks in place. If your child and wants to join Spartans, please get in touch using the details in the Club Information section of this Meridian There are opportunities for the parents too!

Cambridgeshire Leagues The 2023/24 Cambridgeshire FA league seasons for teams consisting of players aged 18 or under started on the weekend of 9/10 September 2023. Swavesey Spartans have 14 sides competing in the mini-league divisions, the colts league divisions and the women and girls league divisions. As you read this article the nights are drawing in and the 2023/24 football season is in full flow. Swavesey Spartans aim to provide football opportunities for all in a fun and safe environment within the framework imposed on all affiliated clubs by the Football Association

Swavesey 100 Years ago (Oct & Nov 1923) From the Cambridge Chronicle

HORSE KILLED BY LIGHTNING. 5th Oct. 1923

A young horse belonging to Messrs. Johnson Bros., Fen Drayton, which was feeding with others in a field near Mow Fen railway gate house, was struck by lightning and killed in the severe thunderstorm which passed over Swavesey on the afternoon of Sunday, September 23rd. As reported last week, a valuable sow was struck and injured and a poplar tree damaged in the same storm.

GOOD ATTENDANCE. 12th Oct. 1923

Four children attending the National School have been awarded bars and one child a medal by the Cams. Education Committee, for perfect attendance, viz., Edith Symonds (medal for one year), Stanley Wood, Winifred Wood and Lionel Wood (bar for two years), and Maurice Godfrey (bar for four years).

CONCERNING MOTOR-CYCLES. 19th Oct. 1923

At the meeting of the Standing Joint Committee on Saturday a member complained of the nuisance caused by noisy motorcycles, and Alderman Dr. J. W. Ellis mentioned that in his village the speed was something terrific. Motor cyclists, he said, went through at 60 miles an hour, and seemed to be proud of it. The Chief Constable remarked that he thought he knew who the offenders were.

ARMISTICE DAY. 2nd Nov. 1923

As Armistice Day (November 11th) this year falls on a Sunday, the two minutes' silence will be observed during the morning service at the Parish Church. At evensong the names of all Swavesey men who served in the Navy, Army or Air Force during the Great War will be read out and remembered in prayer. Flanders poppies will be on sale in the village on the previous day.

WAR ON RATS. 2nd Nov. 1923

A correspondent, who is troubled with rats, points out that the Minister of Agriculture has set apart next week for a special effort to be made throughout the country in the waging of war on rats, those enemies of mankind which devour our grain and roots, destroy our houses and outbuildings, and are the carriers of the worst diseases; and he is anxious to know what steps the local authorities are taking "to stir up the people of the parish to the necessity of trying to keep the brutes down," either by individual effort or concerted action. The rat, the writer adds, is a partial migrant, which at this period of the year leaves the fields and open spaces where it has carried on its destructive work since the spring, to seek shelter for itself and its numerous progeny in houses, barns and stores during the winter, and he urges that it is the duty of everyone who has the public welfare at heart to do everything in his power to reduce the numbers of this very prolific rodent. But a lead should be given by the local authorities.

POPULATION OF THE PARISH. 9th Nov. 1923

The population of Swavesey at the time of the Census in 1921 was practically the same as it was in 1801, when the first Census was taken in this country, namely, 830 in 1921 and 831 in 1801. During the 120 years which elapsed between the first and the last Census, the population rose and fell, e.g., 1,273 in 1841, 1,344 in 1871, 899 in 1901, and 904 in 1911.

A PROJECT ABANDONED. 16th Nov. 1923

There appears to be no likelihood of a Women's Institute being established in Swavesey, yet awhile at any rate. In February, when the question of forming one was first brought forward, the proposal was not received with enthusiasm, it was decided to consider the matter again in the autumn, and, in order that this might be done, a meeting was held in the school on Friday evening. Only eight or nine ladies attended this meeting, fewer than in February, and, as there were other indications that a general desire for an Institute did not exist, there was no alternative but to abandon the project. It seems, however, a pity that an organisation which has been proved to be most useful in other villages, should not find favour in Swavesey, but it is only fair to add that there appears to be an impression abroad that there are already enough societies, etc., in the parish.

NATIONAL SCHOOL. 23rd Nov. 1923

Owing to the prevalence of illness amongst the children, the National School was closed on Tuesday, and will not be re-opened until after Christmas.

HOCKEY. 30th Nov. 1923

The Swavesey Ladies' Hockey eleven gained a decisive victory over the Cam second team at Cambridge on Thursday week by eight goals to one. Unfortunately, Cam could only put nine players into the field, while the visitors were at full strength. The following scored for Swavesey: Misses E. Heasman (2), B. Thoday (2), D. Carter (2), and J. Kirby (2). The return match was played yesterday (Thursday), and again Swavesey ladies scored a victory, winning this time by six goals to nil.

Library of Things and biodiversity areas

Why buy if we can borrow? Shedditi!, Swavesey's Community Shed, is embarking on an exciting and innovative project. We are building a mobile Library of Things due to launch next March. The idea is that Library lends people useful items they need only occasionally, reducing the need for excessive purchasing and wasteful consumption. The Library will use sustainable energy and we hope it will be an inspiration for us all to consume less and recycle and reuse more.

The Parish Council is creating several large raised beds of drought tolerant plants in the public tarmacked area between Priory Avenue and Carters Way. There will be a Mediterranean style herb garden, children's games painted onto the ground and the beds will be arranged so that children can continue to use their bikes and scooters in the area. The Whitton Close wildflower area created by residents looks stunning, as does the area at Swan pond, planted by the Parish Council, and the wildlife area by Moat Way playground is now rich with flowering plant species, many donated by local residents.

The Library Presents is back for a jam-packed autumn season of arts activities in libraries across the county. As always, there are performances and workshops to suit all ages, with music, theatre, dance, magic, puppetry and even some film. The season starts on 1st October 2023 with a reduced version of Macbeth, 'the Scottish Play', and runs through to mid-December, with arts and crafts workshops and many more performances. There is a theme of horror, murder and chills, with Dr Jekyll & Mr Hyde, murder mystery and sinister silent film; but the season also has a lighter side, with fairytales, magic and balloons. Altogether there is a glorious mix of uplifting, enchanting and playful treats for the autumn months ahead.

At the start of the 5th year at the boys County there had been a 5/6 day visit to Paris for those students specialising in French language classes, Needless to say it didn't happen in my year as it was cancelled on account of numerous "Sorbonne riots & demonstrations". It would seem that the French people have a special way of causing havoc and bringing entire cities to a halt. The water cannons were out on the streets shooting all & sundry which put the block on any tourist visits etc. I was lucky enough to score good passes in six of my O level results & went on to study French & Medieval History at A level along with a Latin back up, as Latin forms the basis of so many European languages, I must add that I have only ever spoken it in Italy and slurred the endings of the words a bit but there you go!

The school also had an annual trip to Italy for those lads studying classical languages and/or history so I managed to qualify again for my first ever foreign holiday trip abroad. I think it was about a dozen of us, plus of course 3 or 4 teachers and the headmaster Mr Eagling who boarded what was then the original Trans Europe Express train in London. We didn't have the luxury of sleeper cabins so we crashed out on the bench seats & luggage racks as the first stop for our carriage was Milan, where we spent a day during which we had a tour of the grand old Opera House amongst a couple of other buildings before moving on to Rome.

We visited the Vatican City, though I don't think the Pope was in, if he was he didn't come out to see us! Needless to say we all went to the Trevi Fountain and threw in a few English coins to bring us all good luck & a safe journey home. Before leaving we had the picturesque tour round all the ancient buildings mainly surrounding the Colosseum which of course we entered - the tourist area of course. Sadly we were unable to get inside the Sistine Chapel as it was closed for repairs and internal decorations to the roof. Never the less it was all seen as an amazing step back in time. We then moved on to Venice where we spent 2 or 3 days whilst actually staying on the lido island.

Whilst we were checking out Saint Marks square we actually came across Mr Harold Macmillan and a few of his chums, who was the UK's Prime Minister in those days. After having a couple of days on the main island we went on a trip to the Murano Glass factory which was quite staggering to see what these experts could create by just blowing glass, thoroughly recommend a visit but be careful if you pick any-thing up as it could cost you a fortune if it is dropped!!

All in all it was a pretty good little trip and got even better when, on the very last evening on the Lido, the guys that were running the wine bar where we were staying, started to chat & asked if we fancied a glass of wine, there was three or four of us so we weren't going to say no were we ?, and what's more is that it wasn't actually illegal over there so we had a right old laugh. That is to say until there was a knock on the door in the morning and when i opened it to be confronted by none other than Mr Eagling, our Head master, " aargh Wright " (meaning me) he said , "I'll talk to you later, now get your gang together as we have a train to catch". That was it, ferry to the mainland, board the train with the carriage marked Paris North and off we went back home to jolly old England, via Northern Italy & a quick trip back through France.

When Selwyn stopped being Distribution Manager for The Meridian, he was asked for his favourite article from the past ten years. He immediately choose "Rabbit pie" which was in the June/July 2016 issue. David Crouch was born in Boxworth End, Swavesey in 1930 and lived in the village all of his life. He was widely known and respected throughout many local villages and in Cambridge as The Paraffin Man. He died in June 2018.

The Paraffin Man. Part IV. Rabbit pie

My father bought his first horse-drawn waggon in 1921 to sell paraffin oil and hardwares in Swavesey and around local villages. After leaving school I started working regularly on the rounds with him. I remember him teaching me to always keep the customer's coin or note in my left hand and pass over any change with my right hand before putting the payment in my bag. That way I could always



show the customer their money if there was any query about how much they had paid me. If you weren't on your guard they might claim to have given you half a crown when it was only a two shilling piece. It proved to be good advice over the years.

It was usually late afternoon when sales

representatives visited father and Uncle Will and over the years there were very many of them. Mr Connor who sold china and crockery for Barratts of Cambridge called once a month. Mr Voss travelled for Gossage & Watson, owners of Persil, who were later taken over by Lever Brothers. Mr Cross who called to see Uncle Will was a traveller for a sweet and tobacco wholesalers. My sister Betty and I tried to get home from school first so we could take him the cup of tea that mother made because he would give us sixpence, which was a lot of money in those days. Mr Drysdale travelled for Proctor & Gamble, the Fairy Liquid people and he also liked mother's teapot. He was a betting man and if a race was being broadcast on the wireless he and Uncle Will would have a pound bet on which horse would win. Mr Blunt was still travelling for HP sauce and vinegar when he was over eighty years old and he was a real gentleman. Twice a year father would order between seven and ten barrels of vinegar, each containing twelve and a half gallons (57 litres). Goodness only knows who bought it all from us!

Father's second horse-drawn waggon came from Mr Harry Cooper, a hardware and furniture dealer of Balsham, whose family opened the Cooper furniture shop

in Newmarket Road, Cambridge. Father is holding the horse with this waggon in the photograph taken outside 66 Boxworth End, near the entrance to Rose and Crown Road. In 1938 he bought his third waggon from a Mr Hewson in Fenstanton who was retiring. He got it cheaply because it had been in an accident and the front wheels were missing. He had it moved to Fullers, wheelwrights in St Ives, to be used as a pattern for a new waggon. Unfortunately, while the new one was being made the workshop burnt down and the new woodwork was destroyed. So Mr Fuller restored and repainted Mr Hewson's waggon with father's name on it but the only pair of wheels he had of the right size were from a horse-drawn London fire engine so that waggon had a bit of history about it.

In wintertime when the roads were often covered with snow and ice father had the horse's shoes tapped and threaded to take frost studs. Snow would build up on the iron rims of the wheels and make the four-wheeled waggon hard work for the horse to pull. Sometimes we came across slippery places in the road and had to get sand from heaps by the roadside and sprinkle it down before we dared to continue the journey. Then in summer when it was very hot, wet tar would pick up on the rims, sometimes in lumps as big as teacups. I have known father come home from Knapwell all the way round on the more level ground via Conington and Fen Drayton rather than attempting the steep rise up the hill from Knapwell to Boxworth.

Often on the run home from Knapwell or Conington on a cold, dark winter's evening we might be met by one or two men who would hail father and sell him rabbits, as many as a couple of dozen at a time. When we got into Swavesey he would direct me to take two to this house and two to the one over there and one to the house on the left etc. Of course, we always saved two or three for mother to cook during the week.

Sometimes on a round we would stop at a public house at lunchtime. Not that father drank much but it made a suitable stop for us to give our horse its nosebag. In any case, most farm workers would be stopped at the same time and the last thing a housewife wanted was someone calling as she was serving her husband's dinner. The bag was made of coconut matting, leather bound with a strap to go over the horse's head. It contained the animal's mid-day meal known as "sifting" which included oats, bran and linseed cake and in winter we would add sliced mangels. The horse would murmur while it munched away happily, slobbering from the mouth.

One of the most unforgettable memories I have of that time is riding home late on a cold winter's afternoon after a busy and tiring day. Taking the horse out of the shafts, taking the harness off, feeding her and bedding her down on clean straw for the night. Locking the barn door then walking across the yard, very hungry, opening the back door and being greeted by a glowing fire in the kitchen range. Mother opening the oven door where I could see and smell a lovely rabbit pie with thick, crusty pastry on top, to be followed by an apple pie and custard with cups of hot tea – what more could anyone ask for. I can smell that rabbit pie as I sit here writing this now.

An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

Low Hill is an unassuming yet fascinating feature of Fen Drayton Lakes. It lies within Elney Lake (historically known as Low Fen), on a peninsula which protrudes in from the western side. For most people visiting, it merely looks like a raised mound covered by grass with a margin of reeds, but that belies the history that lies underneath.

Until recently we didn't know much about it but learned more thanks to the work of a student, James Foard, who brought together literature from various sources during his studies and shared them with us.

Low Hill is a type of 'bowl barrow' or tumulus, a mound of earthen construction about 25m in diameter by 1m high. Barrows were sites where burials were made. These were sometimes for just one person or for multiple people. Burial mounds were often built on higher ground so their cultural significance would be visible to people. Finding higher ground is a tricky ask in the fens as there are few areas with suitable topography, so this early example was built up artificially to raise it above the level of the floodplain.

Due to the shape and structure of the barrow, it is thought to pre-date the Romans and is suspected to be from the Bronze Age. Barrows from this period are rare features within Cambridgeshire and this one represents an excellent example, being of a large size and well preserved.

However, there are some unknowns as to what else very early examples may have been used for since they were created. Within the Ouse Valley, two thirds of barrows have been found to be either reused, modified or incorporated into other monuments over time.

The site has never been excavated so these facets of its history can only be alluded to, based on similar sites elsewhere. Thus, what is known about

Low Hill is not a complete picture and one which likely has more stories to tell. In the eyes of James, it stands "as a monument to the people that have lived and died here throughout prehistory and their lost funerary traditions and ritual practices".

When the area was dug out for gravel in the 1990s, Low Hill was preserved. We maintain the monument nowadays by making sure scrub and trees don't take over and affect the archaeology within. It is a great corner for wildlife, and we have even found Harvest Mouse nests in the grass there. Over time we plan to make more of it by installing an information board at the viewpoint by the guided busway.

Wednesday Wander

Ever thought you'd like to know more about the reserve and its wildlife? Volunteer-led guided walks take place once a month, usually on the second Wednesday.

It Will Probably Be Cloudy...

A guide to the night sky over Swavesey during October and November.

As per the title of this article, the peak of the Perseids meteor shower in August was mostly obscured!

Over the last few years, we've been lucky enough to experience visits to planets, comets and more, facilitated by robots sent to these distant locations by space agencies like NASA and ESA. This year is no different, and one of the more interesting missions is NASA's Psyche mission.

Psyche is an asteroid in the asteroid belt, a region of space between Mars and Jupiter, containing millions of bits of rock and metal, and it's the latter that this new mission is looking into. Iron is an extremely important part of our solar system, with all of the rocky planets having a core made mostly of it. Could Psyche be a fragment of the core of a planet that never quite formed? Could this provide an insight into the formation of our own planet Earth?

While Psyche won't reach its target until 2029, its launch, currently slated for 5th October 2023, is something to look out for!

The Draconids meteor shower produces about 10 meteors per hour. It is produced by dust grains left behind by comet 21P Giacobini-Zinner. The shower runs annually from the 6th – 10th October and peaks this year on the night of the 8th. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Draco, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

The Orionids meteor shower produces up to 25 meteors per hour at its peak. It is caused by dust grains left behind by the famous Halley's comet. The shower runs annually from the 2nd October to 7th November. It peaks this year on the night of 21st October.

On 23rd October Venus is at Greatest Western Elongation. This is the best time to view Venus since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the morning sky. Look for the bright planet in the eastern sky before sunrise.

The Full Moon on 28th October is traditionally called the Hunter's Moon. October is a time to start preparing for the coming winter by hunting or slaughtering animals and preserving meat. It is also called Travel Moon, Dying Grass Moon, and sometimes Blood Moon or Sanguine Moon.

Also on 28th October, the UK will see a partial lunar eclipse. From the UK we'll only see a small fraction of the Full Moon pass into the umbra. At its maximum, which occurs at 21:15, just 12% will be in shadow.

Jupiter will be at Opposition on 3rd November. The giant planet will be at its closest approach to Earth and its face will be fully illuminated by the Sun. It will be brighter than any other time of the year and will be visible all night long.

The Taurids meteor shower is a long-running meteor shower producing 5-10 meteors per hour. It is unusual in that it consists of two separate streams. The first is produced by dust grains left behind by Asteroid 2004 TG10. The second stream is produced by debris left behind by Comet 2P Encke. The shower runs annually from 7th September to 10th December. It peaks this year on the night of 4th November.

On 13th November, Uranus will be at Opposition. The blue-green planet will be at its closest approach to Earth and its face will be fully illuminated by the Sun. It will be brighter than any other time of the year and is visible all night long. Due to its distance, it will only appear as a tiny blue-green dot in all but the most powerful amateur telescopes.

The Leonids meteor shower produces an average of up to 15 meteors per hour at its peak. It is produced by dust grains left behind by comet Tempel-Tuttle. The shower runs annually from 6th – 30th November. It peaks this year on the night of the 17th November.

November's Full Moon on 27th November is traditionally called a Beaver Moon, after beavers that build their dams during this time of the year and because this was the time of year to set the beaver traps before the swamps and rivers froze. It is also called Frost Moon, Dark Moon, and Mourning Moon.

World Jamboree Report

All sections resumed sessions in September, with a new programme of exciting activities to look forward to after the summer break. One of our former Scouts, Bill Crowther, had a big adventure at the World Scout Jamboree in Korea this summer. This takes place every four years, and Bill was one of only 45 Explorer Scouts from across Cambridgeshire to be selected for the first event post COVID. Here is his first hand account.

The world scout jamboree was pretty much unlike anything I have ever done. It is the largest gathering of individuals in scouting, with over 50,000 participants, leaders, and volunteers from around the world. It was hosted in south Korea, between the 1st and the 12th of August, on a purpose-built campsite on the coast of Korea; however, the entire process for me to get to the jamboree began much earlier.

It began in December 2021, not long after the end of lockdown, with a selection event in which 45 scouts and explorers aged 12 – 16 from Cambridgeshire were selected from 120 people who had applied. When I first wrote out my application form, I did not expect to be selected. But when I was selected, I realised that selection was probably the least challenging part. To go to the world scout jamboree every UK participant must raise just under £4,000 in the 18 months between selection and the jamboree itself. This pays for: the site; flights to and from the jamboree; events/activities on and off site; accommodation before and after the jamboree; and lastly, for other participants from less well-off countries, who would struggle to raise such a large sum of money.

The fundraising was not easy. I was pretty much at a bake sale one week; hosting a quiz night the next; at a bucket shake outside a supermarket not long after; and organising a Mother's Day café event a few days later. Over the course of eighteen months though it seemed to become easier to manage, I had help from family and other people within scouting which made fundraising much easier to manage, since I wasn't trying to do it all alone.

Finally, after 18 months of waiting, we flew out to Korea. Travel was tiring, made worse by the fact that for me, sleeping on a plane was pretty much impossible. By the time we got to the hotel (which we stayed at before the Jamboree began) I was exhausted. The hotel itself was located near the centre of Seoul (the capital of Korea) there was a lot to do as we waited for the jamboree itself, including a visit to the demilitarized zone, and we met scouts from other countries who would be going to the jamboree.

Before the jamboree had begun, however, there were issues with the site. Flooding due to monsoon rains meant that the site opened a day late due to flooding and when we finally arrived, it was right in the middle of a heatwave. Humidity meant that during midday temperatures reached 37 degrees and felt like between 42 and 45 degrees. The heat meant that activities had to be cancelled, it also caused illness in many people including myself during the course of the jamboree. I was lucky enough to only be affected by heat related illness for one afternoon, but many were worse off.

Despite this, our time on camp wasn't all bad. We talked to people from all over the world and made the most of the time we had on the site getting to know people, doing what activities weren't cancelled, and attending evening events set up around the site. Until, five days from the scheduled closing ceremony the UK contingent pulled out all 4,500 of its scouts and volunteers due to the high heat, poor site conditions, and an incoming tropical storm. The rest of the participants from around the world followed soon after.

The rest of our time in Korea was spent in Seoul, people there were kind to us and seemed to feel bad that we hadn't got the experience we were promised. And yet, whilst the 25th world scout jamboree wasn't the one that we expected. It was still a unique opportunity to learn. We learned about different cultures and people around the world; we learned how to make the best of things when they don't go as planned; and we learned how to overcome challenges. So, although it wasn't what we expected, in my opinion we still had a life-changing jamboree experience. Thank you to everyone that helped me get there.

The battery-operated pooters, which suck small insects into a clear tube for viewing, were popular with the girls and lots of fun! He also brought along 70-year-old butterfly and beetle specimens. We lit fires and toasted and ate marshmallows and finished the evening with enthusiastic campfire singing. 2nd Swavesey Brownies went to play squash at SVC and held a joint meeting with 2nd Over Brownies at the fire pits. The Brownies all had a go at lighting fires, and then they cooked and ate s'mores and sang campfire songs. Seven new Brownies and two new leaders made their promise around the fires.

1st Swavesey Guides completed the Feel Good in Nature challenge over several meetings outdoors. At the Nature Reserve we picked up litter and used all our senses to feel good in nature and become more observant and mindful. At SVC outdoor classroom we picked more litter and tried soap carving and making a dreamcatcher using leaves and twigs. We had three sessions at the fire pits, cooking hot dogs and s'mores to say goodbye to two guides, and for four new guides to make their Promise. Another week some did gas stove cooking (making a favourite meal healthier) and some did Hapa Zome (natural dying using hammers). On our final week we explored how we can care for trees and their associated flora and fauna and planted some bulbs and seeds by the shed. We ate food the rangers had cooked (golden syrup dumplings and mini sausages). We also cooked our own s'mores and popcorn.

1st Swavesey Rangers spent a weekend at our County residential centre sleeping in The Loft at The Jarman Centre. Lara used this to gain her Going Away With qualification and the Rangers did activities linked to a Lord of the Rings themed challenge badge: making mini bows and arrows, hammering leaves onto fabric, making wire rings, soap carving, and doing a quiz to get to know each other better. They also managed to do some cooking over an

altar fire, despite the poor weather, and two Rangers made their promise. The Rangers ended the summer term with a session at the fire pits They cooked sausages on sticks, made camp fire pudding, and made golden syrup dumplings for the guides.

All units took part in a Great Ouse division day, travelling by coach to Hautbois Activity Centre in Coltishall, Norfolk. Rainbows tried, soft archery, pond dipping and night-trail; Brownies did shelter building, climbing and low ropes or obstacle course; Guides and Rangers had bushcraft, crate stacking, raft building and initiative tests. Everyone earned a badge and we finished the day with a hot dog, campfire songs and games before the long drive home, a wonderful day!

PARISH & COUNTY NEWS

From Your DC - Sue Ellington

Hello Everybody

Well it has been a strange summer with variable weather and lots of sport of every variety. The work of the council continues as does the four day week experiment. The administration has embarked on an independent review of the service they provide which will be completed before Christmas. I will report the highlights when they are available.

During the summer the Council has been running a campaign to make householders aware of their duty to ensure they only employ a reputable company to dispose of their waste in order to avoid fly tipping. If a fly tip can be traced back to a household they would be liable for up to a £400 fine. If you see rubbish which has been left on our drives and field gateways, please report it to SCDC either online or by phone. Unfortunately, one dump seems to attract more!

The Council has been awarded significant funding to provide 13 additional homes from phase 2 of the Local Authority Housing Fund for refugees. This is in addition to the funding for 40 homes that they received for phase 1. In total the council has been granted just over £2.4m. The latest award, together with Council borrowing, will be used to provide 10 homes for refugee families from Afghanistan, plus 3 additional properties which we can use for temporary accommodation to reduce the use of bed and breakfast type accommodation for the homeless. Under the terms of the funding when the properties are no longer needed for either refugee or temporary housing they will be treated as normal HRA housing (ie added to council stock). The longer-term legacy for this project will be an increase in social housing within the District. The Council must complete the purchases by the end of the financial year and is looking to acquire a mix of new-build properties from developers, and open market properties through Estate Agents.

It has been good to work with various groups in Swavesey to promote their bids for community or Eco grants which are given by South Cambs District. The Squash club is increasing their insulation and the community group has planted wild flowers, as well as the Parish Council improving the space in Priory Avenue and Carters Way. I am a member of the grants committee and I would encourage any clubs or organisations to apply for grants up to £2000 for the community grant or £15000 for Eco grants. If you want to know whether you are eligible and meet the criteria - give me a ring.

Parish Council News July/August 2023

County Council Business

Unfortunately this year's LHI bid regarding the improvement of the School Lane/Thistle Green junction did not receive the necessary grant funding to go ahead.

Following the re-surfacing of Buckingham Road we are chasing up the repainting of the central white line as you enter the village and the layby lines. Highways will not be replacing the red highway 3-2-1 lines as they are still mostly in place.

A request has been made to Mick George Ltd to carry out repairs & fill the potholes in the tarmac section of Middle Fen Drive.

There has still been no notification as to when the highway & footpath surfacing of Burgess Close and the completion of the junction with Boxworth End will be completed. The PC continues to chase this up.

The parking issues around Market Street and the surrounding area are of major concern & the Police have been asked to visit with regard to the continuous parking on double yellow lines. A working group is to be set up to look in more detail at the parking and access issues around the Market St area and more information on this will follow later this year.

This autumn, the County Council is discussing with the Parish Council the traffic calming options for Boxworth End-Ramper Rd, which will be funded via the Northstowe development to mitigate against increased traffic through that end of the village due to Northstowe. A new webpage has been created to keep residents informed, so please do look at the updates, and consultation events will take place as discussions progress. <https://www.swavesey.org.uk/traffic-calming/>

District Council Business

Mobile Warden scheme: The Parish Council highlighted to the Integrated Care Board (ICB) and County Council, the continuing issues around lack of grant funding towards community warden schemes. A new grant fund to help promote these schemes has now been made available and the ICB will continue to identify other opportunities to support these schemes.

Most of you will have now realised that the wheelie bin collection day has been changed to Fridays as of September 15th.

COUNCIL NEWS

The PC has been awarded a £300 grant from the SCDC Community Chest towards the Community Garden project in the open area on the Carters Way/Priory Avenue Estate.

Drainage

The Environment Agency (EA) has basically put a large number of future local housing developments on hold by raising objections regarding drainage and the lack of water in the sub soil chalk aquifers in our region. The EA are also carrying out further modelling work on the riverbank though the parish, in relation to flood risk. The PC and IDB have been asking for many years for maintenance work to take place to bring this section of the riverbank up to its design height. Data is expected during autumn.

Village Projects & Maintenance

War memorial cleaning, we are currently awaiting quotations for the professional cleaning of the Stone Memorial in the Churchyard.

Hedgehog Highways - The PC has agreed to support this initiative & purchase some hedgehog surrounds, for holes in fences and gates, for distribution in the village, in collaboration with the Sustainability Hub.

Following consultation with neighbouring residents the Poplar trees around Moat Way pond are to be felled this autumn. The Poplars have reached the end of their life, they are already deteriorating and rotting inside. Although it is a difficult to decision to fell trees, safety and risk has to be considered. The area will be re-landscaped and replanted with smaller, native trees.

The Tree Warden's report was considered and other general tree maintenance work will be carried out on trees situated on both the Recreation & Market Street Greens, before next spring.

A small willow tree which fell in Constables Rood has been cleared.

Ongoing Items & Matters to report

The PC would like to thank the 20 or so students who over the 11th & 12th of July cleaned & weeded both play equipment areas, washing the benches around the Recreation & Market Street greens, also gardening and tidying the Memorial Garden next to the Hall. This is in addition to the Swavesey Scouts who litter picked around the village in the first week of July - well done and many thanks to you all. *Continued on next page*

The PC has received confirmation from SCDC that the White Horse Inn has been re-listed as an Asset of Community Value for a further period of 5 years.

A trolley/garden cart has been purchased for use by the village Handyman.

Two street recycling bins have been installed by SCDC as part of a scheme to trial recycling in public areas around the villages. Our bins are located on the Recreation Green & Market Street Green.


Finance

The PC is creating a reserve fund to hold S106 monies from CCC to assist the Swavesey Library relocation & works.

The 2022/23 external audit has been completed & passed with no questions raised.
