November meeting. Thirty five attended a talk on Agricultural Labourers in the 19th Century by Mike Muncaster from Kimbolton. In almost everyone's family history there are agricultural labourers. In the 1851 census general labourers were the most numerous occupational group in England but their status and rates of pay were the lowest, with two similar groups, shepherds and horse-keepers, being paid slightly more. They worked 6 days/week, usually doing a 60 hour week and joining the army, where food, clothing and shelter were provided, was often a preferred way for young men to escape the land. Even in 1914, general agricultural wages were often only 50 to 75% of what labourers got in other jobs. Protest at the way farm workers were treated was inevitable and the first riots occurred in Ely and Littleport in May 1816. After poor wheat crops in 1815, men returning from the Napoleonic wars found high unemployment and hungry people growing angry at the high cost of bread. At Ely assizes in June twenty four of the riot ringleaders were found guilty of which five were hanged and sentences on the others ranged from 12 months in prison to deportation to Tasmania for life. The Swing Riots were a widespread uprising in 1830/31 by agricultural workers in protest at agricultural mechanisation (the advantage of hand-threshing during winter was that it kept men out of the workhouse) and harsh working conditions along with low wages and the tithe system which required payments to support the established Anglican Church. In November 1831 there were riots in numerous villages between Huntingdon and Peterborough and it was the largest movement of social unrest in 19th century England. Three years later at Tolpuddle in Dorset six farm labourers earning only 8 shillings per week, and with the threat of even less pay to come, were found guilty of forming a trade union by taking an oath of loyalty to each other. They were sentenced to 7 years transportation but there was such a widespread protest at the harshness of the punishment that in due course they were pardoned and brought back to England. Five were so furious at how they had been treated that they quickly emigrated to Canada.

December meeting. Around 30 members attended the AGM. After the formal AGM proceedings three Swavesey residents gave short presentations, each relating to the late John Shepperson, History Society's president, who died aged 93, on 27 September 2024.

Selwyn Richardson reported that John was born on 22 July 1931 in the farmhouse at Boxworth End Farm. He was the youngest of four children, and with the three others being girls his parents were absolutely delighted and enormously relieved to have a boy at last. In February 1960 he married Ann Woodward. Ann, John's wife, died 6 years ago, in early 2019. John spent just about his whole working life as an active member of many community groups. He was on Swavesey Parish Council for 37 years, being Chairman for many of these years. He was a South Cambs District Councillor for 28 years. He was on the Board of Governors of Swavesey Primary School, being Chairman for some years and he was also on the Board of Governors at the Village College.

For six years he was a Trustee of the George Long Charity for Swavesey Memorial Hall, and before that he was a member of the Parish Council Hall Committee for many years. John and Ann regularly attended St. Andrew's church in Swavesey where he was a bell ringer for over 60 years and a long-standing member of the Parochial Church Council. He died peacefully in the afternoon of Friday 27 September. He was an outstanding person and he was a legend in his own lifetime.

Carol Pook reported that in 1957 a young John Shepperson agreed to become a Trustee of the Thomas Galon Charity. He served without a break for 60 years until 2017 and for 41 of the 60 years he was Chairman of the Trustees. In 1528, during the reign of Henry VIII Thomas Galon of Wilburton left agricultural land in Swavesey in his will for the benefit of the local Swavesey community. Carol showed a copy of the will which stated that each year in June all Swavesey residents should be provided with ale, bread and cheese. So far as anyone knows, this hasn't happened yet.

John Pook reported that John Shepperson was a Trustee for over 30 years of the Swavesey Fire Relief Cottages Charity. The four original cottages were built in 1914 after the disastrous fire in March 1913. Two more cottages were added more recently in the rear garden during 2021/22 and at the entrance track to the right of the original four there is a plaque saying, "These cottages were made possible by the generosity of John Shepperson BEM, 2022".

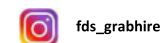

MISCELLANY

It Will Probably Be Cloudy...

A guide to the night sky over Swavesey during February and March.

The full moon on 12th February was known by early Native American tribes as the Snow Moon because the heaviest snows usually fell during this time of the year. Since hunting is difficult, this moon has also been known by some tribes as the Hunger Moon since the harsh weather made hunting difficult.

8th March sees Mercury at Greatest Elongation East. Mercury is the closest planet to the Sun, and the smallest planet in the solar system. It reaches greatest eastern elongation of 18.2 degrees from the Sun. This is the best time to view Mercury since it will be at its highest point above the horizon in the evening sky. Look for the planet low in the western sky just after sunset.

The full moon on 14th March was known by early Native American tribes as the Worm Moon because this was the time of year when the ground would begin to soften, and the earthworms would reappear. This moon has also been known as the Crow Moon, the Crust Moon, the Sap Moon, and the Lenten Moon.

The March equinox occurs on 20th March. The Sun will shine directly on the equator and there will be nearly equal amounts of day and night. This is also the first day of spring (vernal equinox).

A partial solar eclipse occurs on 29th March when the Moon covers only a part of the Sun, sometimes resembling a bite taken out of a cookie. A partial solar eclipse can only be safely observed with a special solar filter or by looking at the Sun's reflection. This partial eclipse will be visible throughout most of northern Europe, including the UK.

29th March also sees the first Super New Moon of 2025. When the New Moon occurs near the Moon's closest approach to Earth, its perigee, it is often called a Supermoon. The Moon will be located on the same side of the Earth as the Sun and will not be visible in the night sky. This is the best time to do some night sky watching, to observe faint objects such as galaxies and star clusters because there is no moonlight to interfere.

Betelgeuse, the Red Giant of the constellation Orion is an easy task to find. In the Northern Hemisphere, Orion begins to rise early in the evenings in

December and continues to dominate the southern winter sky until about April, when it begins to fade into the sunset. Betelgeuse is in the upper left-hand corner of Orion when viewed from an "upright" perspective.

Betelgeuse is a colossal object — and a very bright one at that. As a red supergiant nearing the final phases of its life cycle, Betelgeuse has an estimated diameter around a thousand times that of the Sun, with an estimated absolute luminosity of 100,000 times the Sun. We're talking about an object larger than the entire orbit of Jupiter — an amazing fact to recall the next time you're out observing this star.

Its immense size makes its distance uncertain. Radio interferometry has resulted in more precise distance measurements around 640 light-years in 2008 (though combined measurements published in 2017 give an even farther distance of 720 light-years).

In Arabic, the name Betelgeuse can be translated as "shoulder of the giant." Many cultures throughout history identified Orion as a hunter or giant. To the ancient Egyptians, the constellation was Osiris, a god and primeval king in the culture's mythology. In some myths originating in the Americas, Betelgeuse represented a wound on Orion, perhaps because of the star's red colour. Betelgeuse also features in Aboriginal Australian mythology, as passed down through oral tradition.

Interestingly, historical records seem to indicate that this giant star may have changed colours within human history. According to Roman and Chinese writings, Betelgeuse appears to have been coloured yellow around 2,000 years ago. Only in the 9th century did Arabic scholars first call this giant as red.

Regardless of its distance, observations do make one thing clear: Betelgeuse is destined to go supernova relatively soon, astronomically speaking. Depending on whom you ask, "soon" could mean it has another 100,000 years, or perhaps up to a million years, to live.

Our brother Geoffrey Wright.

Geoffrey was born in August 1938, the first child of Horace and Jessie Wright of Swavesey. In due time he went to the village school (what is now the Junior School), and in the flood of 1947 he was taken to and from school by horse and cart over the flooded road by Turn Bridge. He went to this school until he left at the age of 15 and then went to Cambridge Technical College to study engineering,

The family increased with the arrival of Clifford in April 1943 and Janice in April 1950.

Geoffrey helped his father on the market garden, and almost every spare moment he was kicking a football. He was a member of the school football team and also the team captain. By the age of 14 he started playing for the village football team.

On completion of the 2-year technical college course he gained an apprenticeship with a Pye Company in Cambridge. He travelled daily on the back of Brian Norman's motorbike. His friend Brian was sadly killed on his motorcycle when travelling home one evening. After completing his apprenticeship, he continued to work at Barwell Engineering. After a few years he moved to an engineering factory in Duxford so he could work with CNC machines. He passed his driving test so was able to go to Duxford by car. He was there for two or three years and saw an advertisement for a course being run by the M.O.D. in Gosport. This was to do with costing contracts which he was keen to do. On completion of the course he was expected to work for the M.O.D. for a minimum of two years, and he was posted to the Torpedo Factory in Helensburgh, Scotland. He liked working there, and as the years passed he was also given appointments in Glasgow and Edinburgh. He decided that this was to be his 'final' posting, and decided to buy a flat in Livingston, West Lothian.

Geoffrey was a keen photographer and was often taking photos of our family and places at every opportunity. This could be frustrating at the time, but now we have an interesting record of our children growing up. He was also a keen gardener, and always volunteered to do jobs for us in our gardens, and sometimes he would prune things that we had rather he left alone!

In December 2019 he was found wandering after shopping and was unsure where home was. A kind member of the public took him to A and E. He was sectioned and after scans was diagnosed with Dementia. Clifford went to Scotland to see him, and recommended a care home in Broxburn – a short distance from Livingstone.

Geoffrey did not want to come to a care home down south as he would not be able to go to his church or see his friends, but sadly he was not able to do either. He was very well cared for in the care home, he did not always recognise us when we visited. We were able to have 'What's App' calls during lockdown and up to March 2024 when Helen, one of the carers would hold the phone so we could 'chat' on the days when he was more alert. It was sad to see his decline as he became unable to walk or feed himself.

We feel we had said 'goodbye' to Geoffrey several years ago, but we miss him and give thanks for his life.

Swavesey 100 Years ago (Feb & March 1924)

From the Cambridge Chronicle

AN UNEXPECTED DISCOVERY. 8th Feb. 1924

While engaged in threshing operations last March at Moulton Baugate, Lincolnshire, Mr. George Seekings, of Swavesey, lost his watch in the straw stack. Recently a Waggoner was getting some straw for his horses, when he put his fork through the ring of the watch and pulled it out intact. On being wound up, the watch was found to be in good working order.

PIG FEEDING. 15th Feb. 1924

A good-sized and thoroughly appreciative audience attended the lecture on pig feeding, which was given in the National School on Thursday week by Mr. R. Sayce, County Agricultural Organiser. Ald. Dr. J. W. Ellis presided. At the close of the lecture numerous questions were asked, and there was some discussion.

A SAFETY RAZOR. 14th March 1924

A correspondent writes: That shaving is not always an easy or a pleasant operation as is, I believe, generally admitted by those who have to wield a razor on themselves, and complaints of razors that decline to cut, or that cut too freely, are common. The recent experience of a Swavesey ex-Serviceman is, however, somewhat unusual. Having well-lathered his face, he scraped and scraped, but his safety razor failed to reap the hirsute stubble, although it effectively removed the soapy lather. When almost in despair, a friend came on the scene, and, examining the razor, pointed out that the shaver had omitted to insert the blade.

THE INSTITUTE. 14th March 1924

Forty-one new members were elected by the Committee of the Institute on Saturday evening, bringing the total membership up to 165. That the institute is appreciated is shown by the large number of villagers who attend every evening and enjoy the multifarious games provided, read newspapers and other literature, or engage in a social chat. The Committee on Saturday decided to allow dancing on Mondays from 6 to 8 p.m., and they hope to arrange lectures, etc., on various subjects. For all these advantages the annual subscription is 6s. for adults and 4s. for juveniles, payable yearly, half-yearly, or quarterly, that is less than three halfpence a week for adults, and about a penny a week for juveniles. The subscriptions to the cricket, football and other clubs and societies in the village are, it is believed, at relatively higher rates.

THE RECENT FIRE. 21st March 1924

Inquiries are being made in the village as to when the men, who were employed in connection with the fire in Market Street on January 29th, will be paid for their services.

PERSONAL. 28th March 1924

Mr. William Henry Key was 79 on Monday, and, although "in his eighty," he is still wonderfully active, and his interest in his garden and his orchards is as keen as ever. He well remembers his 50th birthday, which fell on Sunday, 24th March, 1895, for on that day a tremendous storm the worse he recollects during the 54 years he has lived in Swavesey, played havoc with the houses, buildings, trees, etc., in the village, as it did in other parts of the country, and even carried the then sexton of the Parish Church "off his legs," when that functionary was struggling to get home after the morning service.

Swavesey Memorial Hall – 100 years old (Part 4)

One hundred years ago Swavesey Memorial Hall was officially opened for the use of the village. How did the village make use of it?

From its opening Swavesey Memorial Hall has been used, as intended, as a venue for Societies and Clubs to hold their meetings etc. The British Legion were early users of the Hall, and the Swavesey WI has used the Hall since its beginning in November 1928. These are only two of the groups to have taken advantage of the space in the Memorial Hall, opened in 1924.

The Hall has always been used for many social occasions. From the start it was used for Wedding Receptions for up to 50 guests. It has also seen the birthday parties of many Swavesey children.

The building of the Hall was seen from the beginning as a meeting place for villagers to take part in ways to improve their bodies and minds. This was the reason to name the Hall Swavesey Memorial Hall and Institute. In May 1919 during the discussion on the need for a village hall in Swavesey it was also noted that:

“An institute is urgently needed as a place of recreation and resort for the younger people of the parish who now have nowhere to go in their leisure time.”

A committee was formed, rules were decided and the Institute opened to its members on a Monday evening in March 1924. It proved popular from the beginning for improving talks and generally as a meeting place for members. There was a sporting connection which still exists today. A football club was formed as ‘Swavesey Institute Football Club’. The name still exists today, although the Institute does not. A very active Billiards Club was formed from the start and this sport is still represented on the former balcony of the present building.

The Hall also proved useful to education in Swavesey when the main part of the old Village School was condemned as unsafe in November 1934. Two senior classes of the school were removed to the Memorial Hall.

In December 1939 the inconvenience to the users of the Hall was noted by Mr. Barwell, who pointed out that it was accentuated by the arrival of evacuees and their teachers at the start of the Second World War. The ‘two rooms’ in the Hall were used by the 2 senior village classes in the morning and the evacuees in the afternoon. Light was very poor due to the blackout conditions and restricted lighting allowed by the Parish Council.

Overcrowding was eased as the evacuees began to return home during 1940 so the two schools were amalgamated. Only one evacuee remained in June 1945.

Although the new Junior School on the site of the present Primary School was opened in 1937 the Hall was still in use in January 1947 as the new primary school wasn't ready to accommodate all the pupils. The New school was fully used later in 1947 and the children left the Hall, probably with sighs of relief all round!

The hall was popular throughout the 1940's and early 1950's. However, a low point was reached in 1958 when Swavesey Village College opened in the village. Facilities had begun to need attention, so clubs and societies used those of the new community based Village College which of course were newer and cleaner. In order to carry on, the running of the Hall was transferred from a Hall Management Committee to the Parish Council.

The financing of the building was proving so difficult that a Parish Council Meeting of Tuesday 30th May 1961 had a discussion about whether to call a Parish Meeting and

recommend that the Parish be asked for permission for the Council to sell the hall and land. A meeting was proposed for June 1961 of which no records can be found. However, after this the Minutes start to discuss the management of the Hall. No action was obviously taken to sell.

The Parish Council were now in charge of the management of Swavesey Memorial Hall, not a committee from the village which had been set up to do that task. In the minutes of 15 October 1962, the council resumed responsibility for the Hall and decided to draw up a new charity scheme. This is set out in February 1963 with the Parish Council as trustees for the Hall.

In the present century it was realised that the Parish Council should not be in this role. A new charity scheme was set up in 2009 called ‘The George Long Charity’ for Swavesey Memorial Hall. This group of trustees took charge of running the Hall as regards bookings, maintenance and refurbishment. Trustees are elected or nominated by various village organisations.

Swavesey Village Hall still stands and operates as intended by the people of the village 100 years ago to mark the sacrifice of the First World War. The commemoration above the front windows outlines this for the years 1914 – 1919. The usual dedication would be to 1918, however the treaty formally ending the war was not signed until 1919. Also, the only person to be buried with full military honours in the village was Albert Large who died in 1919. Perhaps they wanted to recognise in him the sacrifice of others.

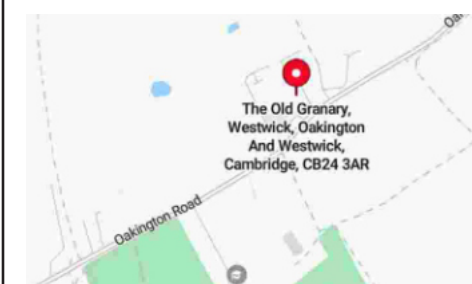

Will Wright Memories

So we were enjoying a few more days gigging in Cornwall as it was coming towards the end of 1967, when the local agent asked us if we would be prepared to come back to play down there on a more regular basis, especially the next holiday season. We decided it would be a good idea so long as we could fit a whole load of new gigs in with those being supplied by our existing contacts and our Cornish agent would effectively become our main booking man and he could find us some local accommodation for residence when we were down there, to which he said there would be no problem. So there we were, approaching the end of '67 with a whole new life on the horizon especially when he came up with a small cottage in a hamlet called Lamorick which is on the edge of Lanivet, a village just 8 miles south of Bodmin and a mile from the A30 - the main route down the South & direct route to Truro. I know it was "another era" but it was amazing to think that the agreed price for the rental of said cottage was 3 guineas per week, except when the Surrey owners came down for a summer break when it was upped to 4 guineas per week, would probably be about £300 or thereabouts these days.!

We began to play in more of the large clubs & ballrooms not only those in Cornwall but also Devon, Somerset, Hampshire, Dorset, Surrey and included in several of the army camps which were in abundance in that part of the country, similar to the air-force bases in our eastern regions, which were obviously open & operational for 12 months of the year, One of the largest venues being the Winter Gardens in Penzance, a long way from not only Cambridge but most of the UK and we performed there on a regular basis both in the holiday season and even when it was a local festival venue outside of the main tourist period. There was a large club in Truro called PJs and we performed in there on 2 or 3 occasions with a local band called Smile, who some 3 years later had obtained a new singer called Freddie, yes his surname was Mercury & the band had changed it's name to Queen.

Unfortunately, Dave our keyboard player, was not able to leave the Cambridge area for several reasons and so had decided to move on which left us as a trio, a bit of a challenge but we managed to move on as a 3 piece band. One amusing fact that rapidly became obvious was that when we were still moving around the county during the winter months that the locals stopped referring to us as "Grockles" which is how they refer to tourists & non-residential people. Furthermore we were advised of many of the tracks & back roads to avoid so much of the tourist traffic during the holiday season.. We had also got very used to the longish journey to & from our new base & had taken advice from truckers as to how we could miss the worst of the tourist traffic. One of our regular journeys would take us across Salisbury plain and past Stonehenge in the days when you could walk around the stones of the ancient monument, and one morning we were passing it when it was surrounded by an enormous number of Druids carrying out their ceremony - a great place to take an observation break.

It was of course very nice to be able to get back home to see our families every 3 weeks or so whilst doing gigs in the Eastern counties and our less frequent availability enabled our agent to increase performance price - not that we were rich but we were making a living and having fun at the same time.. Our converted ambulance had by now racked up about 97,000 miles and was larger than our needs once Dave's Hammond organ was no longer with us so we managed to trade it in for a Ford Transit at the local village garage alongside the A30.

PARISH & COUNTY NEWS

From Your DC - Sue Ellington

Happy New Year to all Swavesey residents. It is always interesting to think what may happen during the year but the Government has provided many hints during December which will keep us all working hard to ensure the village and countryside we love is designed to help progress and not be destroyed.

During December we have had a significant number of Government Grant opportunities which have kept local charities and community groups working hard to submit applications during the holiday period.

These grants include:

- The UK Share Prosperity Fund which has £100,000 and agreed that 22 local small businesses could receive around £5000 each to build their business. They had a significant number of applications which were scored by officers against agreed criteria.
- Improving the High Street Grant which could be £5,000 - £20,000. "High Street" has a very wide definition to include villages without a high street. Further information at www.scams.gov.uk/high-street-grant
- Net Zero Villages which could be £20,000 - £100,000 to provide energy efficiency and generation; Low carbon transport, or Nature based solutions.

All of these grants will have been allocated by the time you read this but it does emphasize that there are grants which local groups can get to support and help development. I am always willing to advise but I rarely know about a new grant in time to publish it here, so check SCDC website regularly.

Other Government activity is also going to affect our area. Apart from East West Rail which looks like it will be approved and will affect the route of the A428 and be between us and Cambourne, the Government is introducing new a National Planning Policy Framework which was launched by cabinet members in Cambridge. This must mean that Cambridge is a key target for increase in housing development. I think we are all aware that a large amount of housing is already planned for Cambridgeshire but I believe that developers must be prevented from land banking in order to keep house prices high.

Finally, The Government is currently consulting with councils about amalgamating District and County councils. I can see that it may be less expensive to have one council but the District council knows what is happening at village level and if Cambridge City were part of the new council, village interests would be overruled. There has been a recent growth in layers of government with the Mayor and the Cambridge and Peterborough Combined Authority but these serve at a higher level and do not understand very local issues.

Parish Council News November/December 2024

County Council Business

The PC continues to discuss ongoing highway maintenance.

Our County Cllr informed the PC of work to resurface part of Fen Drayton Rd, between Home Close and the Nature Reserve Road, which will take place during February. Dates will be published closer to the time.

Local Parish Councils, residents and County Cllrs have been pressing for safety measures along the A1307 between Swavesey-Bar Hill, following serious accidents and lots of near misses since the road opened. The PC has now heard that additional signage and road markings will be installed, National Highways have agreed to either remove or mask the large green A14 slip road sign, which is leading to confusion along the A1307 and the Police will be carrying out mobile speed enforcement.

Along the Fenstanton-Huntingdon section work will commence in January to replace the safety barriers with planned completion by March 2025. Further work to improve drainage and prevent flooding is ongoing and it is hoped to remove the speed limit restrictions by end of 2024.

Traffic Calming projects

- 20mph limit. In November a draft plan for a 20mph limit through the village was received and reviewed by the Parish Council. A number of questions and comments were raised as the scheme did not cover Boxworth End or Station Rd-Over Rd. The questions were returned to CCC and we await new plans for review.
- Updated plans for the scheme for Boxworth End-Ramper Rd were received in November. Following the comments received at the consultation events earlier this year the options have now removed speed cushions but include instead additional flashing speed signs, more speed sign/roundels painted on the road and visual/painted road narrowing sections. These options are being discussed with the CCC project team in January. Further consultation with residents will follow.
- An application is to be submitted to the Local Highways Improvement Scheme (LHI) funding for the 2025/26 financial year for speed reduction measures in Station Rd-Over Rd, as these roads are not included in either of the above two schemes. The proposals will reflect the measures as for the Boxworth End scheme. These are still being discussed in detail with the CCC projects team and as soon as all of the questions have been addressed, further consultation with residents will take place.
- The Parish Council wishes to be able to consult on all three schemes at the same time.

COUNCIL NEWS

- Speedwatch – If you would like to help with Speedwatch please contact the Parish Council: clerk@swavesey-pc.gov.uk. A training date for volunteers is being arranged for Jan/Feb. The scheme cannot happen without a strong group of volunteers and the more there are the less time each person will have to commit.

Combined Authority (CPCA)

A new bus route has started through the village to provide a service to-from St Ives & Bar Hill. There is no longer a bus along Ramper Rd, instead the route comes from Fen Drayton via Rose & Crown Rd then through the village to Over and beyond, returning back along the same route. This has given Boxworth End a bus service again. The Parish Council is now looking at replacing the old wooden bus shelter on Boxworth End with a new shelter.

Drainage

The PC is still waiting for a response from DEFRA and our new MP following the meeting held in September about concerns over the river flooding and lack of maintenance of the two staunches on the River Gt Ouse. The PC has supported the change.org petition requesting action from the Environment Agency to repair the staunches and carry out work on the river to alleviate flooding. The PC continues to lobby the two MPs in this area regarding this and we are awaiting responses.

East West Rail

The PC has made comments to the consultation raising concerns over: additional traffic to/from the station, potential closure of public rights of way across the new rail line, potential for future housing development around the new Cambourne Station which would increase surface and foul water issues to Swavesey drainage system and asking a question about potential freight along the rail line.

Finance

The PC will set its budget and the level of the Parish Precept for 2025/26 in January.

The PC has been successful with a Fund For Nature grant application made earlier this year, towards Climate Action and Biodiversity mapping for the village.

Village Maintenance

Tree planting around Moat Way pond and general tree maintenance around the village will take place across this winter.

The Parish Council congratulates the Memorial Hall management committee for their successful grant application for solar panels and battery storage for the Hall. This project has now been completed and the Hall will now be generating the majority of its electricity from the panels on the roof.

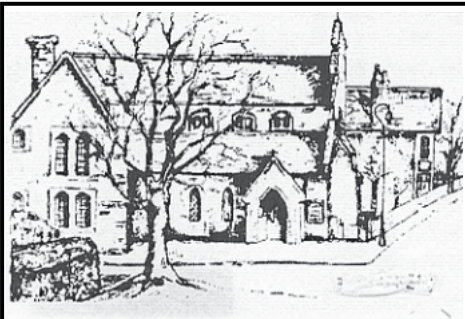

Musings From Pastor Bob

I don't know about you but I am a creature of habit, there are things in my life that I love to do, commitments I have taken on, and then there are the chores that have to be done. But there comes a time when we have to stop and rethink our routines, our commitments and our ideals.

Why would I stop doing something I love? You might ask. Well, I am going through this process because I do think it is important not only to have a to-do list, but also a stop-to-do list. Maybe it is time for us to clear the clutter and create some space for the new, even if we are not really sure what the new commitment, hobby or the service is going to be. It really is time to give ourselves time to breathe and think, and that of course means stopping the old so we can discover the new, or maybe so the new can discover you.

The New Year is here again. I wonder did we complete the targets we set for ourselves one year ago. Was the past year a voyage of discovery of new sights and smells and tastes? Or has it been a plod of routine and the same old same old?

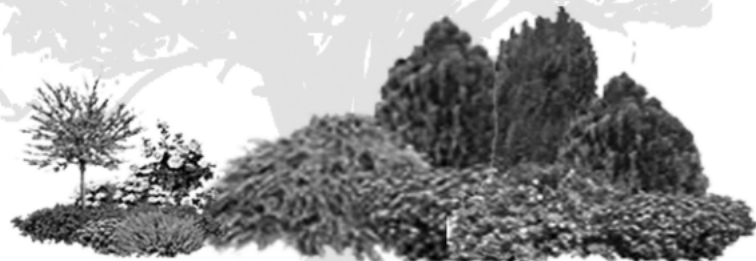

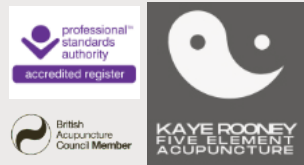
